Enroll now for summer child care

Enrollment for the summer program at the Community Activity Day Care, located in the old hospital building, will be for infants and toddlers (birth to 2 years) — \$2.50 per week; preschool children (2 1/2 years and school age (6 to 12 years) — first child only \$2.50 to \$2.75 weekly (based on income/family size) and second child \$1.00 to \$1.25 weekly (based on the child's age).

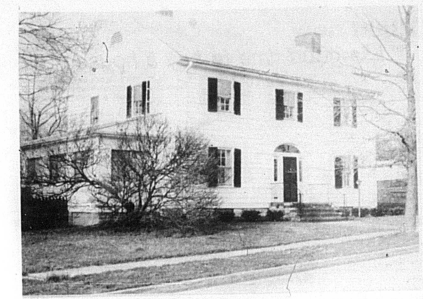
Mr. Standiford is a senior at the University of Kentucky. Mrs. Standiford is currently employed at Kentucky Center.

Warren Fisher home Among those to be toured June 5

(Editor's note: This is fourth in a series of features on homes to be toured Sunday, June 5, sponsored by the Nicholas County Historical Society. Other events of the day will include a luncheon, dedication of the Carlisle Depot's garden, and exhibit on local craftsmen's work. Tickets may be purchased at the depot. Luncheon tickets must be purchased in advance.)

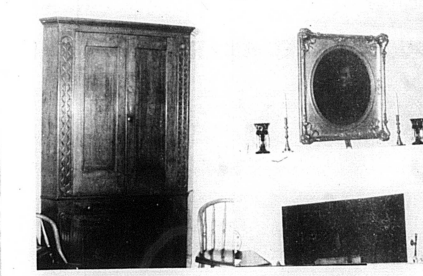
