

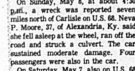
Three wrecks reported

The Sheriff's office reports that it investigated three wrecks in a period of three days over the weekend. No injuries were reported but some of the vehicles were severely damaged.

On Monday, May 8, a vehicle driven by Martin Mitchell Jr., 17, of Route 2, Bowling, Kentucky, was heading on a curve one mile west of Carlisle when it ran off the road. Mitchell's car rolled over and the car went across the road, hit a bank, turned over on its top and skidded off. A passenger certificate was also not injured. He was identified as Wayne English, 16.

On Sunday, May 8, at about 4:30 p.m., a wreck was reported seven miles north of Carlisle on U.S. 86. Near 19 Moore, 27, of Alexandria, Ky., said she fell asleep at the wheel, ran off the road and struck a culvert. The car sustained moderate damage. Four passengers were also in the car.

On Saturday, May 7, also on U.S. 86 about four miles north of Carlisle, two cars collided after the first vehicle, driven by Mark Hampton, 24, of Route 5, Vancouver, Ky., stopped because of bugs on the road. Sheriff's reports said the car was struck from the rear by another, driven by Gerald C. Maher, 37, of Mt. Crati, Ohio.

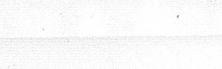
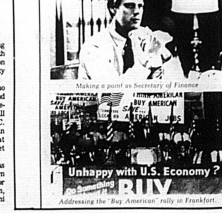

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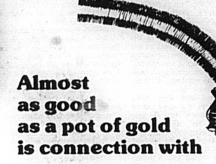

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Price named Nicholas campaign chairman

Tom Harris, Democratic candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture, has announced the appointment of Jimmy Price as his Nicholas County campaign chairman.

Price, 27, farms about 1,000 acres in partnership with his father-in-law, Al Harris, on Highway 124, near Carlisle.

Harris previously served in the agriculture post from 1979 to 1982. Price is that, he served two terms in the Kentucky Senate and as the first Secretary of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection under Governor Wendell Ford.

Farmers reminded to report fall-seeded crops

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) recently closed the signing period for the 1983 wheat and feed grain programs. Farmers are now preparing to report their crop acres to the county ASCS office.

Nicholas County farmers have until May 15 to report the acre and intended uses of their wheat, oats, barley, rye and other small grains to their county ASCS office.

ASCS reportedly checks farms to verify that the acreage reports are accurate and also provides aerial photography for farmers to identify their fields. The acreage reports are used to determine compliance with farm programs and also serve as a basis for the 1983 program base for farmers, according to Commissioner Harris.

The eligible for price support, base, target prices and commodity under the payment-in-kind program, farmers must participate in the 1983 program are required to report the actual planted acreage. Connor said farmers who did not sign up for the program could benefit only by reporting their planted acres because the reported 1983 acreage will be used in establishing the 1984 base acre.

All farmers are urged to report their fall-seeded crops by May 15. The Nicholas County ASCS office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

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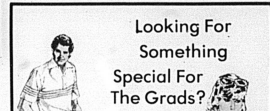

Kendall blasts Beshear
