Mobile Home Owners  
The 1983 tax year will be the first year for mobile homes (trailers) to be listed as real estate due to the passage of House Bill 711. In previous years, mobile homes were listed as tangible property such as cars, trucks, boats, etc.  
The purpose for this change was to make the Homestead Exemption available to people who own their mobile home but not the land it is parked on.  
Notices are being mailed to mobile home owners showing the value placed on their mobile homes. These assessments will not depreciate. If you feel your assessment is not a fair value, come in to my office during the inspection period to discuss the matter, or if necessary, file an appeal in the county clerk's office.

**Camp for children with cancer to be held in June**

This summer will be a very special summer — an Indian summer for some of Kentucky's most special children, those battling the complications of cancer. Indian Summer camp will be held for the second year, June 19 through June 25 in Carverville at Camp Kyoc. Founded by the Lake Cumberland District Cancer Council, an advisory group of the McWhorter Cancer Network, Indian Summer is a unique summer camp, not only because of the special activities it provides, but also because of its purpose. While love and protection are natural responses from parents, there is a tendency for children with cancer to be over-protected or isolated. The children themselves often need the freedom to romp, play, and learn on their own. Because they often cannot be accepted into standard summer camps due to the medical regimens they must maintain, and due to the usual cost, summer camp is merely a dream for many. For these children, Indian Summer is truly a dream come true.  
This camp features a wide variety of recreational activities and learning experiences during its session. Trained fishing, handcrafting, nature hikes, and camp related activities. Other special events — such as a visit from members of the University of Kentucky basketball team, and other special Kentucky music and drama — it rounds out a week of fun and recreation.  
Cancers ages seven to 17 are invited to enroll. Since the camp is a nonprofit program, the cost of attending will be low — \$20 for the full week's session. Camperships are available to anyone who needs financial assistance, upon

**EKU phone numbers to change soon**

The majority of campus telephone numbers at Eastern Kentucky University changed Sunday, May 15, as the university converted to a new communication system.  
The new communication system provided by South Central Bell is being tested by EKV for a 60-day period and is expected to save the university approximately \$20,000 in recurring costs over the current system.  
James Keith, EKV's director of communications services, says that while the telephone numbers for the president, vice president, housing, admissions and public information offices will remain unchanged, many of the administrative offices and nearly every faculty member will be assigned new numbers.  
Keith advises the public to be especially aware of the main campus telephone numbers that will change to 606-425-1900.  
Telephone calls placed to any of the key administrative numbers that have been changed will be automatically transferred to the campus operator. Persons who attempt to telephone a faculty member that has been changed will get no response and must retial the main campus operator.  
EKU officials request that the public be patient during the transition period. As a service to the public, temporary directory listings are available on campus at the Division of Public Information, Powell Building (second floor), and the Division of Administration Desk, and the Division of Admissions and School Relations.

14. He will seek to strengthen the principle that government closest to the people is best capable of handling local issues, by working steadfastly to enhance local government.
15. As one of his 4-year terms, he will work actively with local officials and the General Assembly to state revenue sharing program for all counties, will support the existing severance tax sharing program, and he will support the continuation of federal revenue sharing for local government.
16. He will require state officials to work with rather than dictate to local officials.
17. He opposes any change in current laws with respect to the offices of county attorney or commonwealth attorney.
