Joseph F. Conley home Fifth house on tour

The house was built of brick made on the East Union Road. According to the late Miss Nancy Talbot, a longtime resident of Sycamore, her grandfather made the bricks. The handrails front door was crafted by Luge Anderson.

William Brown owned the house from 1883 to 1900. Two other families owned the house for a very short time, then S. L. Oving lived there from 1901 to 1920.

Owens' daughter, Stella Bell, owned the house until 1924 when W. L. Bunton purchased it. Bunton extensively remodeled it, tearing off an old kitchen, replacing it, and adding a garage and upstairs sleeping porch (which the Conleys use as a den). The Conleys purchased the house in 1925.

"I've always been a food lover and read together," says Mrs. Conley. "The best choices green sweetened with various shades of red to serve as a background for the many family antiques. Some of these heirlooms include a cherry table made by Mrs. Conley's great-grandfather Gibson, a rocking chair belonging to her great-grandmother Lantry, a cherry dresser, and a love seat, a parlor table belonging to Conley's family. A chair belonged to his mother, who was a abolitionist. She carried the chair with her to school on horseback.

The Conleys have purchased several antiques through the years. These include a pool table, a candle stand, while playing dining chairs, a pine side, a parlor set, a table, and a slave rocking chair dating to 1770.

One of Mrs. Conley's most unusual finds is a "make your own" cabinet compartment for concealing the family silver. She also purchased some pieces in St. Louis. One is a huge picture of a Shakespearean scene. She also found a table she found in the slums of St. Louis.
