### Nicholas gets 25 CETA jobs

The number of summer jobs for economically disadvantaged youth in each of the 12 counties in the balance of state CETA grant sponsor area was announced by Human Resources Secretary Bobby Adams.

The Cabinet for Human Resources, through the Department for Manpower Services, has received more than \$1.5 million to fund 1,988 jobs. The number of jobs in a county is based on the number of economically disadvantaged youth in that county compared with the number of economically disadvantaged youth in the balance of state area, Adams said.

The program is open to youth who are 16 through 21 years old whose family income is at or below the federal poverty level.

In Nicholas County, 28 such jobs are available.

Thanks to Lillian Leiber for taking care of the birthday party for me this month.

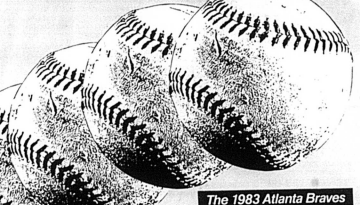
