Kay's Kitchen

The recipes that we have been published before, but since I have had numerous requests for these and others, I thought it a good idea to give you them again this week since they are appropriate for this season.

With fresh strawberries on the market, here is the recipe for English Strawberry Shortbread.

SHORTBREAD
2 cups all purpose flour
2 tablespoons powdered sugar (heaping)
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup margarine
Salt dry ingredients into bowl and work in the butter with your fingers until it is the coarse cornmeal. Smooth out on a greased baking sheet until about 1/2 inch thick. Straglien edges by gently pressing with a spatula, smoothing top with open hand. Prick all over with fork. Bake at 325 degrees or 275 degrees about 30 minutes.

Calisto squares while still hot. Allow to cool before removing from baking sheet with spatula. Wash and hull strawberries and cut in fourths. Dip each cup. This helps to keep them from getting waterlogged. When berries are dry dip into crystal ball and sprinkle with sugar to taste.

When ready to serve place shortbread squares in bottom of serving dish (you will need a deep one). Cover with berries, another shortbread and more strawberries. Serve with fresh cream, and to make it pretty, top with a spoon of whipped cream and a perfect strawberry. In spite of the cream the shortbread will be crisp to the last bite.

This shortbread may be used with other fruit.

BROILED BASS
4 pounds of bass
2 tablespoons salt
1/2 cup lemon pepper
1 cup butter
Use whole dressed fish or filets. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place on greased foil or broiler pan. Add dish. Broil with butter or with half butter and half lemon juice. Place 3/4 inches from heat and broil 5/7 minutes or until lightly browned. Brush with butter and turn carefully. Bake again and broil 5/7 minutes or until fish flakes easily.

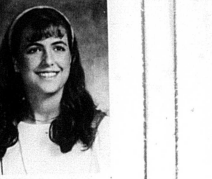

"Our house is meant to be lived in," says Mrs. Nathan Young. Two homes are built and decorated in a day, and the Youngs have spent the past 25 years making a comfortable and livable home.
