Goalkeeping for Louisville basketball fans was a little better last week when Louisville coach revealed that U.L. has gotten better commitments from a pair of nationally acclaimed high school basketball players.

■ **Colin Henderson**, a 6-9 210-pounder from Marietta, Ga., visited U.L. last weekend and told coach Bob Watkins that he will sign with U.L.

■ **Faver** of the year in Georgia in 1982, Henderson is rated the fourth best high school senior guard in the country by Basketball Weekly and a second team All-American in Street & Smith. He averaged 21.3 points and 18.8 rebounds per game last year.

■ **Kevin Walls** will lead U.L.'s Camden County. A 6-2, 185-pound guard from Camden, N.J., Walls played for Louisville. He led the 16th highest scorer in the country by Basketball Weekly and a second team All-American in Street & Smith. Walls averaged 24.2 points and seven assists last year.

Under NCAA rules, high school seniors can sign with a college or university during the week of Nov. 3-8 or they must wait until the spring signing date in May.

UK surprise

While the recruiting reputation rated somewhere in the vicinity of Mount Vernon, it is surprising why would the University of Kentucky be the No. 4 ranked team in a Kentucky basketball fan poll.

■ **Kenyon** basketball fan poll ranked last week when Todd Ziegler of Jeffersonville told a block of reporters in the school's gymnasium that he will sign with UK when the early signing date arrives Nov. 9.

Last month Ziegler was just an average 6'7 forward prospect who most basketball scouts rated somewhere below Steve Miller, Herbert Brown and Fred Thibault at Kentucky.

■ **Bennett** and Brown signed with UK last Monday however, Ziegler was listed as a 6-6 forward and had visited UK. The days later, The Associated Press listed Ziegler as a 6-9 and then came the press conference.

Deer hunter's five biggest mistakes

There are two types of wildlife law violators: those who set out the liberty to break the law and those who, through oversight or a lack of knowledge, find themselves on the receiving end of a citation to appear in court.

■ **Comment**. Otherwise deer hunters make one of five common mistakes, according to Steve Yont, director of law enforcement for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. So pay particular attention to these five points and you'll very likely avoid a citation from a conservation officer.

(1) Make sure you have permission to hunt on the land where you're actually hunting. Property boundaries are sometimes vague and it's easy to wander onto land where you shouldn't be. Also remember that the law requires you to obtain written permission from the landowner before you hunt with a rifle of .36 caliber or larger.

(2) Don't forget your orange. Deer hunting regulations stipulate that gun hunters must wear a hat, cap, jacket, vest or coveralls of hunter orange color. The entire garment must be hunter orange and white. It is necessary to wear only one of the items listed above to be legal. The more change you have on the better your chance of being seen by other hunters.

(3) Remember to carry both your hunting license and your deer permit with you — and don't get so excited when you finally do bag a buck that you forget to tag it. The law requires that the tag portion of the permit be attached to the deer before you take it to a white tag.

(4) Don't forget your hunting gear. There's a general closed season from Nov. 1 until the last Thursday in November, when small game seasons open. During this time, hunting for those species which otherwise have a year-round season is prohibited. So even if deer hunting is now and a grouse presents a tempting target, don't shoot — not only will you be in violation of the law, you'll probably
