

Eighth-Ninth graders must strengthen education

As students in this community return to school this fall, those entering the eighth grade are making a decision that is as important as any they will ever make. It is the decision to attend one of Kentucky's public universities for four years from now. If the answer is yes, he or she is being advised to choose the new Pre-College Curriculum, now available at Kentucky's high schools.

This year's ninth graders are making their decision now because in the fall of 1987, when they hope to be ready for college, every applicant for Kentucky's public universities will be expected to have taken the Pre-College Curriculum in high school as one of the requirements for regular admission to these institutions, which enroll only two students.

What will the ninth graders who choose the Pre-College Curriculum be looking forward to? First, this Curriculum requires at least 20 units of academic credit. (A unit is officially the study of a subject for two semesters.)

Included in the 20 units of the Pre-College Curriculum will be four units of English, three units of mathematics, two units of science, and two units of social studies. Besides the Pre-College Curriculum will also be required to choose courses in foreign language, the arts, computer literacy, and additional courses in science and mathematics.

Until this year, the public universities of Kentucky had an "open door" policy, which required only graduation from an accredited Kentucky high school as the major admission requirement. The Pre-College Curriculum was established earlier this year by the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, which sets the minimum standards of admission to the public higher education institutions in the state. According to Harry M. Snyder, executive director of the Council, the Pre-College Curriculum will be a major step forward in ensuring that students arriving on the state's university campuses are prepared for the difficult and serious work of earning a college education.

"And even those students who don't plan to attend one of our public universities should benefit from attending the Pre-College Curriculum," Snyder said, "because this Curriculum represents the basic preparation for college or university a student wants to attend. It is also being recognized that a high school curriculum based on the fundamental subjects is one of the most effective pathways for a full and successful life, regardless of what a student's personal and occupational goals are."

Snyder said to urge all entering high school freshmen to discuss their choice of curriculum with their counselors and their parents. He pointed out that the Pre-College Curriculum is only the minimum requirement for admission to Kentucky's public universities, and that individual universities in the Kentucky public higher education system may have stiffer requirements that the students should be aware of.

Beginning in the fall of 1987, high school graduates who have not completed the Pre-College Curriculum will have their choices for public higher education limited to the community colleges and a small opportunity to qualify for admission to a public university by presenting some other evidence of their ability to do college-level work. But this fall's ninth graders should be aware, Snyder said, that the Pre-College Curriculum is their best assurance of qualifying for college, and succeeding at college once they are accepted.

"The Pre-College Curriculum may be more than a stepping stone to college," Snyder continued, "because it is a program that should benefit all the people of Kentucky from this day on. Beginning in the fall of 1987, the Pre-College Curriculum (15 required units) are:

- English (four units) - English I, English II, English III, English IV
- Mathematics (three units) - Algebra I or Algebra II, Geometry, Advanced Mathematics
- Science (two units) - Biology I or Chemistry I or Physics I, additional Science course
- Foreign Language (two units) - World Civilization, United States History
- Elective (two units) - Foreign language courses, Arts courses, Computer Literacy courses, additional Science courses.

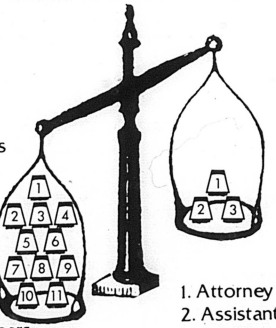

stability in the middle-East. It is in our interest to see a strong and rapid end to the current war in the Gulf.

Americans must come to realize that, if we are to continue our standard of living, we must maintain an access to the energy reserves located in this part of the world.

I'm convinced there is no quick solution here. We are dealing with centuries of blood feud originated by a differential goal of the Soviets, through their surrogates, our "presence" in the Middle East, and the Islamic fundamentalists who are the Lebanese. But the system, the Iranian and the PLO understand, that is why they are working so hard to try and force the institutional force out of Lebanon.

The government of Lebanon is not what I would wish it to be. It will not become more representative if it will ever succeed. But it is the legal government and there are no alternatives in becoming more responsive to national concerns than this sectarian force. It will take time for it to evolve. Fear is its enemy. Without the multinational forces it will not have the time it needs.

I am convinced about these who are dedicated to forcing us into a more aggressive role. I think our posture is a difficult role. It requires restraint and discipline. But our currency lies in the lack of aggressive intention and our most recent of departing the area when the situation becomes chaotic.

You are correct about Congress' record on foreign affairs. There are too many personal interests competing for that body to be responsive in situations requiring quick responses and long term results.

I don't have all the answers. Much of what I see here I don't like. But I'm confident of one thing: Lebanon needs us. She needs us to be resolute and strong against foreign influence and neutral and non-aggressive toward the various Lebanese factions.
