Food prices up

Meats from the meat counter, rising 1.4 percent and 1.8 percent respectively. Fruits and vegetables provided additional increases. The survey found, registering a six percent jump. On the down side, beef and milk products were lower. Beef prices fell 1.5 percent while dairy items dropped 1.3 percent.
Individual food items showing the sharpest increases included hot dogs, up 10 cents to \$2.38; corn, down 10 cents to \$1.24 a pound; spare ribs, 11 cents higher to \$1.86; Idaho potatoes, 17 cents more for a 16-pound bag to \$2.35; corn oil, up 13 cents a bottle to \$1.40; and vegetable oil, up 20 cents to \$1.43 a bottle.
Whole milk had a three percent trend during the month, averaging \$1.47 a gallon. That was the lowest price for the beverage in more than three years and was 19 cents below the high mark of \$1.28 registered in April 1951.
Morbidity had the lowest food marketbasket average among the 27 Kentucky communities where food prices were canvassed, while Madisonville was highest. Price checking for the marketbasket survey is done monthly by volunteers working with Kentucky Farm Bureau women.
The high-range among localities showed an unusually wide variance during the month, almost \$1. Lowery is granted to surveys in hard-to-reach areas under the survey rules, however, which sometimes produces variances affecting local comparisons. The local marketbasket averages are: Morehead, \$1.83; Georgetown, \$1.83; Tompkinsville, \$1.83; Campbellsville, \$1.80; Silverdale, \$1.77; Greenville, \$1.73; Glasgow, \$1.69; Hopkinsville, \$1.68; Elizabethtown, \$1.67; Wilmore, \$1.72; Leno, \$1.68.
Henderson, \$1.18; Lexington, \$1.75; Owensboro, \$1.81; Shelbyville, \$1.83; Greensburg, \$1.80; Georgetown, \$1.82; Brandenburg, \$1.1; Louisville, \$1.86; London, \$1.82; Jackson, \$1.81; Dry Ridge, \$1.77; Nicholasville, \$1.82; Cynthiana, \$1.85; Frankfort, \$1.73; State Ford, \$1.80; and Madisonville, \$1.84.
At the other end of the food marketing chain, farm price increases generally ran ahead of retail table prices for the month of September's most recent reporting period. Cash prices for corn, wheat and soybeans surged to seasonal highs, fueled by reports of drought-damaged crops. More bread levels of a year ago. On the major commodities produced by Kentucky farmers, only beef cattle showed a substantial decline.
