Plan now for 1984 tax credits

Bread - butter, Red - green, Valentine - heart. Taxpayers should be aware of the 1984 tax credits. The 1984 tax credits include the energy conservation credit, the child tax credit, the dependent care credit, and the earned income credit. The energy conservation credit is available for energy-efficient homes. The child tax credit is available for children under 17. The dependent care credit is available for dependent care expenses. The earned income credit is available for low-income workers.

Child and Disabled Dependent Care Credit

If you pay for someone to take care of your child, disabled dependent or disabled spouse during 1983, you might be entitled to a credit of 20 to 30 percent (depending on your adjusted gross income) of your expenses up to a maximum credit of \$750 for each qualifying dependent and \$1400 for two or more dependents. If you have one qualifying dependent, the maximum credit ranges from \$400 if your income is \$20,000 or over, or \$200 if your income is \$10,000 or over, to as much as \$750 if your income is \$10,000 or less. For two or more qualifying dependents, the maximum credit ranges from \$1,400 if your income is above \$20,000 or over, to \$900 if your income is \$10,000 or less. You can claim this credit on Form 1040 or Form 1040A. See IRS Publication 504, "Voluntary Tax Methods to Help Finance Political Campaigns."

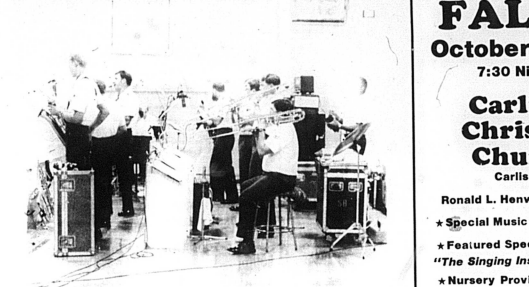
Child and Disabled Dependent Care Credit

What does this mean? If you are in the "one-parent tax bracket" and you have enough deductions to itemize, you reduce your tax bill by only \$20 every \$100 of limited deductions. If you qualify for the credit, you may choose to receive it as a part of your paycheck. If you are eligible for the credit and are receiving a dependent child's payments, the state will determine the amount of advanced earned income credit payments you are entitled to.
