

Medicare deductible premium to increase

The Department of Health and Human Services has released the following information concerning the Medicare program: The deductible for Part A (hospitalization) will increase from \$54 to \$56 Jan. 1, 1984. Each year, by law, the Medicare hospital deductible for the following year is set at a level equal to the average daily hospital costs for the previous year and the monthly premium rate for calendar year 1984 will increase \$1.00. As the difference between the two items larger, the Medicare deductible increases. The rise of the deductible also increases the amount of co-insurance beneficiaries must pay if they remain in the hospital for more than 60 days during 1984.

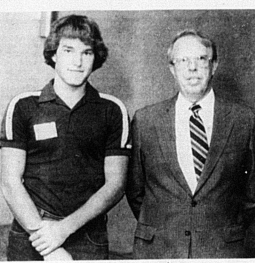

Osprey killed; reward offered by sportsmen

The Blue Springs Wildlife Federation of the League of Kentucky Sportsmen, representing sportsmen club from 14 northwestern Kentucky counties, and northeastern Kentucky counties, and the Boone County Wildlife Club have joined financial forces and are offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person who shot and killed an osprey near the Chicklog boat landing on Cove Run Lake, Oct. 6, 7 or 8. The osprey, or fish eagle, is a large, fish-eating, hawklike bird of prey. The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and the Wildlife Division of the Tennessee Valley Authority have in the last two years established a program to reintroduce the osprey to the Commonwealth.

Leaf position important in sheeted, baled burley

Federal tobacco graders will be paying closer attention to how burley leaves are placed in sheets and bales this year before assigning a grade, according to state Agriculture Commissioner Allen W. Barkley II. The tobacco is not packaged according to the guidelines, it won't receive a grade, Barkley explained. "No government grade means no price support — and no price support means the farmers who sell their crop through this year's drought will still lose."

NURSING ASSESSMENT COURSE OFFERED AT HARRISON MEMORIAL
The Nursing Service Department of Harrison Memorial Hospital in Cynthiana will present a continuing education offering Nursing Assessment of Cardiac and Respiratory Systems on Nov. 18 from 10 noon-5 p.m. Registration begins at 11:30 a.m.

The offering has been approved by the Kentucky Board of Nursing for the contact hours. Instructors for the course are Janet Riggs, R.N., C.C.C., chief nurse at University of Kentucky Medical Center, and Rachel Stipe, R.N., C.N.I., head nurse ICU/CCU at Harrison Memorial Hospital. Topics of discussion include anatomy and physiology, normal and abnormal function, and components of a history and physical exam to include in a nursing assessment of the cardiac and respiratory systems. Cost for the course is \$19 for Harrison Memorial Hospital employees and \$15 for non-employees. Pre-registration is required. Deadline for registration is Nov. 7. All who apply will be accepted. It is recommended you bring a stethoscope to class if you already own one, but not required.
