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computed at a dozen grades of good and choice seed, bags and 50 lbs. These included XP, XP, CF, CF, HP, HP, BHP, BHP, and a quantity of MGR (mixed).
Earlier the same company had started the current string of purchases by taking 546 bags each of BHP and BHP, all of the Association's holdings in these grades.
Before the purchasing move started the Association had on hand nearly 170 million pounds of extra-quality, or carryover, from 1982. That balance will be offered for sale by sealed bids, beginning Oct. 1, under 1983 program rules, and the bid proceeds distributed to growers as an advance payment.

In a year of many changes in the barley program, the apparent demand for the entire storage stocks of loan tobacco marks another reversal, this one brought on by this summer's drought.
As the farmers' "sweat-out" fund will be based on less acreage this fall the fund will be smaller than expected. The USDA in setting the 1983 crop contribution may add a further increase to make up for the crop shortage.
In response to a USDA notice the barley Association directors had recommended that last year's contract be related to seven cents per pound. Now with the short crop the USDA may add another two cents or more.
Determination of the amount of the fee for 1983 should be forthcoming soon, as the October 1 sales offer on carryover stocks must include it in the net returns.

New title law may end stolen vehicle traffic

The heart of the state's new title law aimed at reducing stolen vehicle traffic in Kentucky went into effect Tuesday, Sept. 6.
"This was the beginning of the end of Kentucky's reputation as a dumping ground for stolen cars," Vehicle Registration Commissioner Tim Helson said. All new applications for automobile and truck titles must be cleared through Frankfort.
Helson said the title applications will include the vehicle's identification number, its current odometer reading and details of any liens against the vehicle.
"We have personnel trained in detecting forged or altered documents to prevent fraud in the transfer of ownership. The vehicle's serial number

will be submitted to the National Crime Information Commission to see if it has been reported as stolen," he said.
The new procedure involves completing the title application obtained at the county clerk's office. If a car or truck is being titled in Kentucky for the first time, a certified instructor from the sheriff's office must inspect the vehicle. There is a \$3 charge for the inspection. If it is a new vehicle purchased from a Kentucky dealer, no inspection is required, Helson said.
The owner will then give the completed application to the clerk who keys all the information into the statewide Automated Vehicle Information System (AVIS). If there was a lien against the vehicle with the former owner, it must be released in the county in which it was recorded prior to the current transaction.
The clerk's office will then forward the title application and lien release papers to Frankfort. There is a \$8

NEW COMPUTERIZED IRS COLLECTION SYSTEM
WORKS SATURDAYS, EVENINGS
If you are delinquent on your Federal taxes, don't be surprised if you get a call from an Internal Revenue Service representative during the evening or on Saturday.
Beginning Sept. 6, IRS office collection operations for Kentucky will be handled by the new Automated Collection System (ACS) call site at Indianapolis, Ind.
The system, which will operate from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., weekdays and until noon on Saturdays, will be responsible for collection of delinquent taxes in Indiana, Kentucky and West Virginia. ACS integrates computer and telephone technology to control collection accounts, allowing an account representative to contact taxpayers, generate correspondence, and record actions with an almost total elimination of paperwork. Implementation of the Indianapolis site is part of a nationwide plan of the system, scheduled for completion in 1984.
Delinquent taxpayers will continue to receive notices from the IRS service center as in the past. If this doesn't resolve the case, it will then go to the ACS site where an account representative will make telephone contact with the taxpayer to resolve the delinquency.
Each account representative has a terminal and a telephone that is connected to the call site computer. The computer sequences the cases in the type of tax owed and the amount of the delinquency. It gives the taxpayer's phone number, while displaying the account information on the representative's display terminal, enabling the representative to discuss the case with the taxpayer without referring to stacks of papers. The system can reschedule the case for future call-backs if there is a problem with the line busy, and it enhances IRS capability to locate taxpayers and their assets.
