Sen. H. Stanley Blake dies in Georgetown

Former State Senator H. Stanley Blake, 81, died Friday, Sept. 24, 1983 in Georgetown. Blake lived most of his life in Carlisle. He was a farmer, tobacco warehouseman, a deacon of Carlisle Baptist Church, and a graduate of Lexington Business College. Blake, a Democrat, was first elected to the Senate in 1951, representing the 30th District. The district originally was composed of Nicholas, Harrison, Robertson and Pendleton counties. A 1961 redistricting plan enlarged it to include Grant and Bracken counties. Blake served six consecutive terms and was seeking his seventh when he was defeated in the Democratic primary by Wilson Palmer in 1981.

In 1964 Blake sponsored legislation to amend the Kentucky Constitution to lower the voting age to 18 from 21. He fought increases in cigarette taxes and sponsored soil conservation measures. He was an advocate of the horse industry and supported measures to keep the horse business in the Blue Grass. He was chairman of the Agricultural
