Adjustment period stress aid offered

Each year an estimated 30 to 40 percent of freshmen leave college before classes even have a chance to begin. Dr. Tom Dunn, professor of sociology at Western Kentucky University, has come up with an idea to make the adjustment period for college freshmen easier.

Dunn is cooperating with a freshman assistance program at Western, which is working with freshmen in residence halls by playing sociological simulation games designed to help students adjust to their new environment.

"The idea behind these games is to retain as many students as we can," Dunn said.

The games were designed by the U.S. Navy to help soldiers adjust to going overseas in strange countries. Dunn said, "Dunn emphasized that the simulation games will not pretend how to succeed in college, how to study or how to live in dorms. Instead, the whole idea is to help students learn to get along and how to succeed in their new environment," he said.

Dunn and his assistants will be in selected residence halls during the first four nights of the semester playing the game with interested freshmen. "The first week is so traumatic for a sizeable number of freshmen because they don't mix well and they need something to do," he said.

If the plan helps even just a few people, he said, it's well worth it. Dunn said.

In addition to helping students adjust to college, Dunn said, the games also help plans will contain "messages" about life in a new environment and how to make the change easier.
