Tipton was elected to the stockholder board of Eastern Kentucky PCA and will serve a three-year term.

Robert Mack of Russell County, Virginia is the newly elected president of Eastern Kentucky PCA. He and his wife Bonnie plan to move to the Pennsylvania area in the near future.

Orientation was conducted at the Farm Credit Banks of Louisville, district headquarters for Production Credit Associations and Federal Land Bank Association in Indiana, Ken-

tucky, Ohio and Tennessee and the Louisville Bank for Cooperatives. All are components of the nationwide Farm Credit System which extends short, intermediate and long-term agricultural credit to farmers and their cooperatives.

The orientation gave directors an overview of the Farm Credit System, and focused specifically on the role and responsibilities of PCA directors.

Orientation was held at one of the PCAs in the Fourth Farm Credit District. It provided short and intermediate agricultural credit to 1,800 farmers in 24 eastern Kentucky counties. Outstanding loan volume is \$2,000,000.

Girl Scouts sell 349 cases of cookies

Girl Scout troops benefited in record numbers from the annual Girl Scout cookie sale this year, according to the Wilderness Road Girl Scout Council of which local scout troops are affiliated.

According to Mrs. Sam Reynolds, local cookie sale chairman, a total of 69 cases or 4,136 boxes of cookies were sold by 88 Girl Scout representatives from troops 200, 202 and 271, Junior Troop 267 and Seniors and Cadettes of Troop 164.

Sales which ended here March 28

were approximately the same as last year, she reported.

"Overall, there was a five percent increase in the number of girls participating in the sale this spring. The council currently provides Girl Scout programs and services to 17,000 girls and 4,821 adults in 27 counties.

For the second year individual troop members had the opportunity to earn program fee certificates during the sale. These certificates can be redeemed to cover fees for summer camp and other programs. Girls earned a \$10 certificate for every 100 boxes of cookies sold.

BOTH GIRLS and parents have responded very positively to this incentive program, particularly because it relates directly to Girl Scout activities," said Rose Marie Wehling, Girl Scout executive director. "We anticipate another increase in our summer programs due to this incentive."

Agri-bond, grain aid legislation is passed

Local farmers should be helped by financial and protective legislation passed during this session of the Kentucky General Assembly, according to Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner David E. Howell.

Howell had special reference to a pair of bills introduced by him farmers get low-cost financing and to insure grain farmers against catastrophic losses in the event of the bankruptcy of elevators where they store their grain.

Both bills, House Bill 51 (Agri-Bond) and House Bill 52 (Grain Insurance), were approved following negotiations over amendments in conference committee sessions late Thursday, the next to last day of the session.

HOUSE BILL 51 creates an 11-member authority as part of a new

half-centage hotel checkoff fee paid by the farmer the Kentucky Grain Insurance Fund from which farmers who lose financially because of the failure of grain storage operations will be paid.

"Kentucky farmers are now paying the highest farmer production costs in history and this, coupled with having to settle for prices that are substantially below the cost of production, their crops, has created financial losses on elevators where they store their grain."

"Good farmers are being forced out of business, not because they are bad managers. They are just victims of too high taxes. We have unstable markets at home and abroad, poor weather, high interest rates and high production costs," Commissioner Howell continued. "It's a wonder as many farmers stay with it as do."

"State and federal agencies have established tax-free, low-interest financing to every imaginable retail and commercial enterprise for years," the Agriculture Commissioner continued. "The same treatment for farmers has been far past due."
