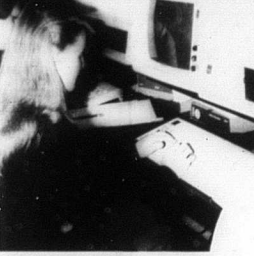
**MILARD F. ASBURY**

## Immediate action sought to curb tobacco imports

Faced with a deteriorating market for domestically grown tobacco, a group of Farm Bureau leaders has asked for an immediate limit on tobacco imports to be imposed by President Reagan.

The request was made to Agriculture Secretary John Block in Washington by presidents of the American Farm Bureau and some 12 state Farm Bureaus where tobacco is grown. Kentucky Farm Bureau President Ray Mackey was one of the speakers.

Block was asked to recommend imposition of the import limit to Reagan under provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act, the basic legislation governing the tobacco price support program. Section 22 of the act authorizes the President to restrict imports by up to 10 percent if the alignments are found to be causing the tobacco program's operation.

Mackey, in a later report to the Kentucky Farm Bureau Board of Directors, said the request was made in an effort to bolster market prospects for the 1984 U.S. tobacco crop. Last year's crop, one of the shortest in history as a result of dry weather, was virtually ignored by tobacco companies, as more than half the total barley production and a sizable percentage of livestock feed were consumed in the surplus pools.

Mackey said imported tobacco is taking an increasing share of the U.S. market, so much so in fact that last year's barley imports totaled more than the 775 million pounds of domestic barley which went into the pool. "If a substantial limitation could be placed on imports," Mackey told the directors, "that would do more to revive next year's tobacco markets than any other conceivable action."

THE CALL by the farm leaders for Presidential intervention to boost the tobacco economy comes at a time when the industry is bracing for what could be a make-or-buy year. With more than 300 million pounds of barley in surplus stocks, and farmers gearing up to produce a 700 million pound crop this season, many observers say that a major stimulus will be needed to boost buyer interest in the 1984 crop.
