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Cancer clinic

Last year in Kentucky, 548 women died from cancer of the breast and 186 died from cancer of the cervix. Over 80 percent of these deaths were preventable.

On Thursday, August 16, the Nicholas County Health Center of the WEXCO District Health Department will hold a special free clinic for women aged 40 and older.

Services to be provided are pap smears for the diagnosis of early cervical cancer and self-exam instruction; a simple test a woman performs herself to make sure her breasts are cancer free.

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Kay's Kitchen

Sorry to be so long in answering several requests, but I usually try to keep the column written a few weeks ahead. The Yorkshire Pudding, of course is a good any season. All you need is a good roast of beef. And if you still have beef and are tired of cooking and freezing them, make the Tully Beans. The tomatoes are late this year so make the Green Tomato Pickle recipe isn't too late.

YORKSHIRE PUDDING

1 cup sifted flour and 2 teaspoon salt, gradually stir in 2 well-beaten eggs and 1 cup milk and beat with rotary beater until smooth. Pour into hot shallow pan containing 1 cup hot beef drippings. Bake in 400 degree oven 25-30 minutes. Cut in squares and serve at once with hot roast. Serves six.

To bake in pan with roast, drain all but 1/4 cup drippings 1/2 hour before serving. Place roast to side of pan, pour in 1/2 cup drippings and bake 15-20 minutes longer. You will have a dish not unlike a popover.

If the pudding is cooked in a separate dish from the beef, serve it from the dish in which it was cooked. Substitute the pudding for the meat. Any overproof dish will do, 18th or 19th century. Hot muffin tin containing about 1/4 inch hot beef drippings or butter may be used. Bake 20 to 40 degree oven about 15 minutes. (Serves four to six. Overproof and bake 15-20 minutes longer. You will have a dish not unlike a popover.)

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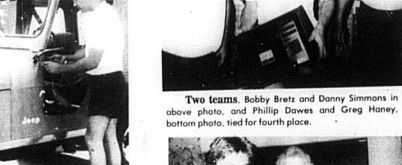
