Projections for the 1985 tobacco market indicate that an additional 100 million pounds of surplus tobacco could require storage. That could require the farmers to spend \$12 or 14 cents per pound, Arnold said.

County clerk

The amount of payment of police protection during the Blackberry Festival was an issue again this year between the American Legion and the city council. Mayor Hughes stated that last year's October Shows, which were the rides and concessions, paid \$200 toward the cost of police protection. Hardin said that offer was not made this year.

Council stuck to its guns even after Hardin said that the Legion lost money on the festival this year and would have to postpone a bill by five years before he could pay the \$800. A motion by Councilman Fry and seconded by Vaughn to let the Legion pay only the \$12 overtime was defeated.
