

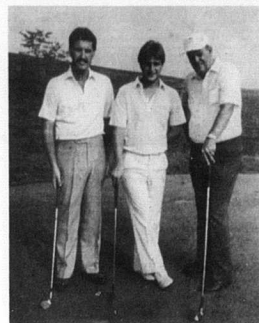

All in the family

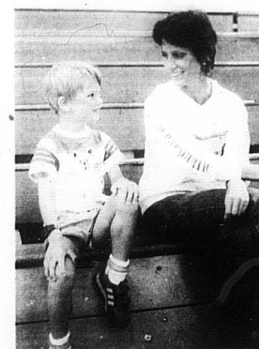
Dudleys have won 8 of 11 championships

The senior Dudley began the domination in 1974, repeating in 1975, '76 and '77 before being dethroned by son Tim in 1978.

Tim lost the title in 1979 to David Zachary but came back to recapture it in 1980. The following year Andy regained his earlier form and returned the trophy to the Dudley household. Lions Club horse show September 8

\$1,050 walking horse stakes; Hunter classes precede event

The second annual Lions Club Horse Show, scheduled Saturday night, Sept. 8 will include the debut of hunter competition as a pre-show event. At least 18 horses will compete in Hunter Over Fence, featuring novice and regular hunter classes, under the direction of Les McDevitt of McDowell Stables of Carlisle. Fences two and three feet high will be installed at the East End Recreational Park for the 8 p.m. start-up. The horse show, set to begin at 7 p.m. features 17 classes, including a \$1,050 walking horse stake. Bourbon County biggest employer of commuters

When KY commuting Nicholas County's largest employer is the morning's workers' leave hours in the morning to which county do most end up? If you said Bourbon County move to the head of the class. According to a study by the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, some 305 local persons 18 years and older are employed in Nicholas. On the other hand only 93 from Bourbon travel east to Nicholas.

Which county, then, sends more folks here to earn a living? It might be surprising to learn that more Fleming Courthouse, 105 to be exact, make their each work day than any others, more 27 from Nicholas are gainfully employed in Fleming. The Department of Economic Development figures show a total work

force of 1,882 persons living in Nicholas County. Of this number 1,874 work and reside here, based on the 1980 U.S. Census of Population. Ninety-nine failed to list their place of work. OF OTHER commuters leaving the county, 197 wind up in Harrison and 198 in Lexington. Others travel as follows: To Montgomery, 28; Clark and Harrison, each 14; Marion Co., 10; Madison, 10; Pike and

Clark (10); three, each, Woodford, Rowleson and Jefferson, two each and Robertson, one. Others commuting into Nicholas County read as follows: From Bath and Fayette, 46; Robertson, 34; Clark, 30; Montgomery, 11; Kenton, two; Mason, five; Hancock and Powell, two each and Menifee, one. Figures above count 133 persons commute nowhere. They are employed Ohio, six; Madison, four; Pike and

Cattle unhurt as brakes lack on tractor trailer

A tractor trailer loaded with 78 head of cattle enroute to Lexington from Farmington caught fire Aug. 22 at 8:45 p.m. about five miles north of Carlisle on U.S. 60. According to Nicholas County fire chief Mark Hughes, brakes locked on the truck, owned by the S & B Cattle Co., resulting sparks which set the minor blaze. No damage was reported to the vehicle or the cattle which remained relatively calm during the proceedings. Firemen made two runs last Friday, the first to a 2 p.m. kitchen fire at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hinton Garfield on Highway 36, four miles from Carlisle. Fire started from a gas leak, causing damage to the grill and stove hood as well as some electrical wiring. About 1:15 p.m. the department was called to control a grass fire following a firecracker explosion scattered on U.S. 60, seven miles north of Carlisle. The fire spread from roadside farms set out to warn motorists of the accident. Firemen were on the scene about two hours, hoisting the highway once the grass fire had been extinguished. A car belonging to Wayne July caught fire on East Union Road Sunday afternoon. It was quickly extinguished and firemen were notified as the truck approached Henry Hill.
