## Millersburg Rotarian new district governor

Robert L. Turner, Millersburg Rotarian for over 30 years, was elected District Governor nominee of Rotary District 61 at the district conference meeting in Mayville.

Turner will govern the 41 clubs of the district for the 1964-65 year. He is a 1960 graduate of Millersburg Military Institute, a veteran of four years service in the Army Air Corps in WWII and a graduate of the University of Kentucky in 1946.

He has been a high school teacher for 28 years, eight years at Millersburg Military Institute where he was commandant, 10 years at Paris High School and 10 years at Bourbon County High School.

## Sousley monument dedicated

The Elizaville Cemetery was the scene Sunday afternoon at 2:30 of a military ceremony dedicating a monument to the memory of P.F.C. Franklin Runyon Soulely, United States Marine Corps Reserve, who was one of the first to raise the American flag on Mount Suribachi on Iwo Jima in February 1945 during World War II. The photograph of that flag raising has become known world wide, and a statue of the man stands in Arlington Cemetery in Washington, D.C.

Soulely, 19 years old and the youngest of the flag raisers, was killed a month later on March 21 by sniper fire during clean up operations around Glenn Point. He had been assigned to Company "E", 2nd Battalion, 28th Marine, 4th Marine Division prior to landing at Iwo Jima.

His mother, Mrs. Gladys Soulely Price of Elizaville, participated in the dedication ceremony along with Master Sergeant Shirley T. White, U.S.M.C.R., who sparked the idea of a special monument for Soulely and spear headed the formation of the Soulely Foundation.

Former Marine Corporal Joe Rodriguez, who served with P.F.C. Soulely's platoon on Iwo Jima, gave a short profile of each of the men who raised the flag. Of Soulely, he said, "He was a freckled little kid who was well liked, and bragged that he had to wash at least once every week."

Congressman Carl Perkins and Larry J. Hopkins spoke at the ceremony of "giving more" and "ultimate sacrifice is many make."

Also on the program were Marine Corps Reserve officers Major Stephen C. Stevens, Lieutenant Commander Richard W. Hansen, CMC, Brigadier General F. Trotter, Commanding General of the 4th Force Reconnaissance Battalion.

During the ceremony, 11 year old Franklin Clark, who served in World War I was introduced to the crowd. He had traveled from Georgetown to attend the dedication, and was wearing Marine medals of honor presented to him during the war 40 years ago.

Following the unveiling of the monument, four U.S. Army jet band members gave a performance on the final salute which culminated a ceremony of honor and dedication for Soulely, his mother and the Marine Corps Reserve.

## Arnold 'grateful' to voters

Less than 22 percent of the 4,099 registered voters in Nicholas County cast a ballot in last Thursday's primary election. Only 823 votes were tabulated, including 10 absentees, a 22.38 turnout percentage.

The 48-year election, which historically has meant a tight voter turnout, was a concern of incumbent legislator Adnan Arnold, who told The Mercury he is "very grateful" to Nicholas County voters for the 136-vote edge (52.54) he received here over his closest competitor, Rex Crouch of Bethel, in their race in the 7th Legislative District.

Carlele's Carlisle Lester ran second, locally, polling 253 votes. In his first bid for a district seat, Lester was a political unknown to many Bethel and Montgomery voters and as a distant tied in both counties.

Voters in Arnold's home county of Montgomery had given their native son a 51 lead over Crouch. Both voters retained in kind, leaving the race very much up for grabs, pending the outcome here.

Tallies in the first seven Nicholas precincts reporting Arnold a slim lead, with Moorefield, considered Crouch territory, yet to report.

As expected, Moorefield voted 71-50 in favor of Crouch, a tie margin that was offset when Hartsville and Headquarters collectively voted 30-20 in favor of Arnold.

Total figures in the three-county district showed Arnold with 223 votes, Crouch 260 and Lester with 228.

The winner returns to Frankfort since he has no Republican competition in November.

**PRIMARY SIDELIGHTS**—Only 20 Republicans cast their vote. To be on the safe side, 126 persons in both Mary's Office and Engle House precincts pulled the lever for Don Hamilton for U.S. Senator. John F. Brown Jr. received 51 votes, despite having withdrawn as a candidate weeks ago. In the 19 local precincts, Engle House led the turnout with 175, followed by Mayers Office with 164 and Moorefield with 151. Arnold carried every precinct except Moorefield, and barely edged Crouch 23-21 in Myers. Lester was the choice of Engle House voters, polling 79 to 81 for Arnold and 29 for Crouch. He ran a strong second in Mathias, 23-28.
