trying to stay within the law. He also advised Thorburny that in order for him to continue the business legally, he should look into the possibility of operating a private club and to seek a license for such.
JIMMY BEAN'S request was for an ordinance to be passed that allows the serving of beer only in restaurants, pool rooms or taverns and not in package dealer establishments. Also to establish a seating capacity to prevent "very little beer in the well" along Main Street from hanging as a sign and starting a business. Shaw presented a copy of an ordinance which was passed in Paris and which he would like the Council to adopt for Carlisle.

Council did agree to adopt a similar ordinance, and it had its first reading after minor changes were made. A second reading and vote will come at the July meeting.

The ordinance states: "No person shall consume any malt beverage on the premises of any place of business within the city, except business buildings, houses and actually operating as restaurants or pool rooms, taverns or private clubs which have adequate seating capacity for at least 100 persons. The penalty shall be \$100 fine for each offense."

Mrs. Max Margaret Hester, representing Community Action, appeared before Council to request \$2,000 for gas and oil and small repairs on the van used at the Community Center. Her request was granted. The same amount was allocated in the city budget last year.

It was announced that a city employee fair try will be held at the City Lake Saturday, June 20. Mayor Hughes read a letter of congratulations from Mr. and Mrs. David Lyons to the Council for replacing the Walnut Street bridge.
There will be a called meeting Monday night, June 15, to discuss salaries, the budget and the water ordinance.

Milk prices may rise

A program intended to reduce the amount of surplus milk products the government buys may reduce the nation's dairy production rather than reduce it. And that could cost Kentuckians.
Congress enacted the Milk Diversion Program in November 1963 in an effort to reduce the national surplus of dairy products.

Dr. Gary T. Lane, Extension dairy scientist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said the number of dairy farmers in the Southeast signing up for the program could result in shortages of fresh milk in Kentucky and other Southeastern states.
"Some areas of the country have reduced production much more than others. The 11 states in the Southeast, headed by Virginia, Kentucky, Arkansas and Louisiana, contracted to reduce production by about 1.8 percent."

"The Northeast states contracted to reduce production by only 1.3 percent." Lane said.
DAIRY PRICES in the Southeast may rise because demand for milk and milk products is traditionally greater in those states which contracted for the greater reductions in production.
"The result is a short supply of milk in the southern states. And that means added costs to transport fluid milk to this area," Lane said.
The supply of milk in the Southeast is expected to even further from the level of demand by September when milk consumption usually rises sharply.

"Consumers may see an increase in fluid milk prices this fall because of this shortage in the South," Lane said. The government's interest in reducing milk production was prompted by rising costs in the price support program, a federal program in effect since 1949 to guarantee predetermined prices to dairy producers.

RECORD CROPS in recent years which made feed less expensive, and high price support levels combined to encourage dairy farmers to increase their production.
