Buyers pool plan proposed by Mackey

With record amounts of tobacco in cooperative storage and prospects for a bumper crop in 1964, speculation is already raging over the state of next year's farmer assessment to insure that the program doesn't cause the government to lose money.

In the two years since the no-net cost feature was added to federal legislation, the assessment has gone from one cent to over a penny. Many say it is likely to go 10 cents or higher later this year unless a special change is made in the program.

A number of proposals have surfaced to deal with the growing displacement of U.S. tobacco by foreign lead. Among them are suggestions that outright limits be placed on imports, that domestic quotas be cut further, that marketing costs be shifted from seller to buyer and that the no-net cost program be expanded to cover manufacturers' imports.

Mackey said another suggestion calls for converting current net plus tobacco into generic cigarettes for distribution through service cooperatives affiliated with the 48 state Farm Bureaus. Those cooperatives have the idea of insurance, tires and other machinery supplies, plus a variety of food products, including frozen fruits, cheese and jams.

On an optimistic note, Mackey told his audience that growers "will find a way to survive" the major problems facing the tobacco industry. He said the companies should not doubt the resolve of farmers to hold onto their historical production rights, noting that the crop is "basic to the survival of 30,000 farmers as well as the economic health of rural communities who have enjoyed the touch of the golden leaf."

"We have been given the franchise to produce this commodity," he said, "and no one will wrest it from us."

Things on the grow at Avon's BGAD

Rep. Larry J. Hopkins (R-Ky.) has announced that Lexington Blue Grass Army Depot (LBGAD) at Avon has been assigned a major communications, electronics maintenance and repair mission.

The mission will employ an additional 300-400 persons initially and is expected to add over 1,000 new employees when fully operational, an increase of 300 percent over present employment.

"What this mission represents, initially and potentially, is a tremendous boost for our local economy," Hopkins said.

The new assignment will produce an annual payroll of \$9 million dollars.

beginning mid-February 1965, climbing to over 800 million when full employment levels are reached within the next five to six years," Rep. Hopkins said.

A number of Lexington Blue Grass Army Depot contractors will be invited to Avon for a pre-bid inspection of the site and facilities. In July, formal bidding procedure will commence, leading to an announcement this fall of the award of a 5- to 6-year contract.

The Army's selection of LBGAD has been hailed as a welcome reversal of an eight-year trend of manpower reductions and underutilization of the Central Kentucky facility, which has seen employment decline from 3,300 persons in 1976 to a low of 1,075 in 1979.

The current civilian employee strength level is at 1,210.

"This announcement does more than simply break the cycle of despair that has enveloped Lexington Blue Grass Army Depot for too long," Hopkins said. "It sends the message to the Dept. that the high technology work that is the wave of the future, the Army facility takes its rightful place on the leading edge of the evolution that has taken America's military establishment from an age of mechanization to one of electronics," Hopkins said.

The LBGAD historically has been one of the cornerstones of Central Kentucky's economic stability. The Army's action insures that it will continue to play a vigorous role in the future progress of the region.
