You will want to buy more Girl Scout cookies to make these easy, quick and delicious desserts.

- PEANUT CREAM DESSERT**
 - 1 cup whipping cream
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 24 Girl Scout Peanut Butter Sandwich cookies
- Whip cream with vanilla and sugar. Spread some cream on each cookie and stack cookies, side by side to form a roll. Cover roll with remaining cream being sure to cover completely. Refrigerate several hours or overnight. (The longer the better) the better it gets.) To serve, spoon some of the roll onto a dessert plate. May be topped with more whipped cream and crushed cookies. \$19-serve.
- BLACK FOREST PIE**
 - 1 batch unbaked pie crust
 - 1 teaspoon can cherry pie filling
 - 1 teaspoon almond extract
 - 1983 Girl Scout Sandwich Creme cookies
 - 1 cup whipping cream
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 or 1 crushed Girl Scout Almond Fudge Sandwich Creme cookies into the pie crust spoon 1/2 of the cherry filling. Add the almond extract to the remaining filling in the can and mix well. Arrange whole cookies on top of the cherry filling in the crust, covering filling. Spoon remaining filling over the cookies, smoothing top. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees) for 20-30 minutes, until filling is bubbling and crust is well browned. Remove from oven and allow to cool completely. Whip cream with vanilla and sugar. Spread over cooled pie. Sprinkle crushed cookies over the top. Serves 4.

HEAVENLY CREAM CAKE

- 1 cup heavy cream
 - 1/2 cup instant cocoa mix
 - Dash of salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 40 Girl Scout Shortbread cookies
- Whip cream adding cocoa mix gradually. Beat in salt and vanilla until mixture is quite thick. Using half of the cream, spread some of the mixture on each cookie and stack together side by side in a roll, placing on a plate or serving dish. Frost roll with remaining cream covering all of the outside. Store in refrigerator several hours or overnight. (Dessert improves the longer it stands.) Slice diagonally. Serves about 4.
