Wildlife authority guest of sportsmen

Dr. Roland Burns, noted wildlife authority, was the guest speaker at the third meeting of the new Nicholas County Wildlife Club Inc. Thursday, March 8, at the library. A total of 27 persons joined the club. Burns registered for membership.

Burns of the University of Kentucky has been presenting the program on the whitetail deer in Kentucky. Dr. Burns has been conducting population studies in the pioneer weapons area at Cave Run Lake over the past few years.

The result of his studies indicate that through the efforts of the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Department and local clubs, the wildlife population throughout the state has been on a constant increase.

One study showed that the number of deer harvested in 1978 was 2,078 compared with 18,770 in 1983. Each consecutive year since 1978 has resulted in a harvest increase.

This is due directly to the conservation measures being used by the Fish and Wildlife Department and being endorsed by county conservation officers.

During the slide presentation Dr. Burns illustrated the consequences that overpopulation and the little food base at the Sheraton Forest in northern Kentucky earlier this year.

The problem resulted in the controlled hunt directed by the Fish and Wildlife Department in hopes of preventing the starvation of deer in the area. Dr. Burns said that this will increase the amount of food available and improve the quality of the overall population, Dr. Burns said.

The next scheduled meeting is April 11, 7 p.m., at the library. People of all ages interested in the conservation of wildlife in Nicholas or surrounding counties are welcome to attend. For information contact C.T. McClanahan, president, 289-2406.

Guthrie, McClanahan represent local GOP on state committee

Two Nicholas County men will represent local Republicans on the Kentucky Republican State Central Committee.

Bill Guthrie of Carlisle and Calvert Ashby of Casey Creek Road, party co-chairmen, will serve as delegates in forthcoming district and state conventions.

It is doubtful alternatives will be chosen due to lack of party interest here. Guthrie led the Mercury.

McClanahan served as chairman of Republican candidate Jim Stumpp's unsuccessful bid for governor last fall.

UNDER THE direction of Republican National Chairman Frank Pabrenkopf, 1984 has been designated the "Year of the County Chairman."

At each district convention, three delegates and three alternate delegates will be chosen for the Republican National Convention in Dallas, TX, beginning on Aug. 20.

At the state convention, 18 at-large delegates and alternate delegates will also be chosen for the national convention.
