The Mountain Division is one of 15 geographical divisions that make up the Red Man Tournament Trail. Each division has six tournaments, bringing the national total to 90 events.

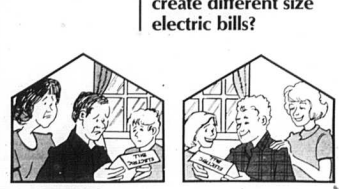
