The commencement exercises were held at the University of Kansas in Lawrence, Kan.

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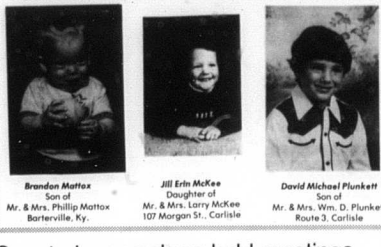
