WATCH OUT FOR WEE WAYS ON DOWNWOOD TREES

Three ways the preening shears and loo loo the lawnmower. Get ready for the annual invasion of female dewdrop leavers.

Though they are not actually wasps, Extension horticulturist Dr. William Fountain of the UK College of Agriculture said they they likely bear a striking resemblance to their stinging cousins.

"They look like an itching-wasp," Fountain said, "and they prey on weak and wounded trees."

Fountain suggested care with the lawnmower to avoid scarring damaged trees and providing a site for the insect to begin boring. "No pruning now, and keep lawnmowers away from the trees. Lawnmower scars are a prime entry point," Fountain said.

THE BEEBEE fly at eye level or below, an effective preventive treatment will consist of spraying Lindane at 100 parts per million. Lindane is available at most hardware stores.

"At that point the only effective treatment might be some very powerful systemic pesticide, and those would be limited to use by professionals," Fountain said.

It is cheaper and more effective to treat the tree with an early application preventive, according to the specialist.

Pork, poultry declines hold food prices steady

A manage and egg breakfast cost considerably less during May, according to Kentucky Farm Bureau's latest food price survey, but steak for dinner landed a higher price tag.

Those two highlights typified the May marketbasket findings, as declines in pork and poultry sales offset price hikes for other foods, holding the monthly food price average nearly even with the April figure.

A weekly grossing of 45 food items cost \$60.33 in May, the survey found, just points above the March and April averages, and only two percent above the \$58.99 figure of May 1963.

FRESH POULTRY and eggs, which have been the grocery store villain in recent months with record high prices, posted sharp declines this month and returned to relatively normal levels. Four of five pork cuts moved lower, but as well, but beef cuts, dairy products, fruits, vegetables and grain-based foods all showed price increases.
