Why town forums on education

Education has been a much discussed topic for the last few years. How often have you heard someone say "The parents with the schools isn't so much as to do, it's how to do it?" And how often have you heard "people get the schools they deserve; schools just won't improve until people get involved and show they care?" Both statements are fundamental to improving education in Kentucky.

Parents with good ideas isn't easy, but many sincere people are trying. Much has already been accomplished by Governor Collins, Superintendent McDonald and the 1981 General Assembly. Now Governor Collins has a Council for Educational Reform. Superintendent McDonald has a Committee for New Directions. The members of the General Assembly have been working on one issue since before the last legislative session, and our citizens, ourselves, and groups of school teachers, parents and many local school officials have been concerned for some time.

But when the time arises for turning ideas, no matter how good they are, into reality, how do we do it? It becomes the big challenge. Yet the solution is right in front of us - to create change people really do have to show that they care and they have to get involved.

The first step is for people to come together in their communities to think about and talk about, and then to do something about their own schools. To encourage this local discussion we are working with the Governor and Superintendent of Public Instruction and many groups and businesses which are concerned about Kentucky education to organize "town forums" all across Kentucky.

These forums will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, November 15. One hundred twenty-five school districts, out of a total 184, have committed to have forums. Parents and citizens, teachers and school officials, business people and others will gather to talk about what we really want our schools to be doing.

This meeting is just the first step toward creating the public in the schools. If these first town forums go well it will encourage people care, they will continue through local organizations into 1985 and beyond. Real reform will take time.

Educational improvement will come only when people prove, especially to those running the schools and those in elected office, that they care enough to act. The Governor and legislators must hear that their efforts for education are supported. And the system must be that challenge that "people get the schools they deserve" answered with "we want good schools, and we're going to get them!"
