Kay's Kitchen

The holiday season is here. We can't help putting the thought behind us. It's time to get busy and be prepared for those days when family and friends are in view. Entertaining doesn't always mean a big party. A cup of tea and cookies served in the afternoon, or a plate of sherry makes for a brief visit. All occasions are left made with children and the hostess in mind for more adult ladies. You may serve them with a special treat in mind when the fruitcake season is '84. The hostess' time of the year makes them new, fresh and back to back.

MIDWINTER DELIGHTS

- 1 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1/2 cup (1 1/4 sticks) butter, chilled and cut into small pieces
- 1/2 cup strong coffee, chilled
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 12 oz. unsweetened chocolate chips, melted
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1/2 cup (1 1/4 sticks) butter, melted
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoon coffee liqueur
- 2 eggs, room temperature
- 1/2 cup finely chopped toasted walnuts (use pecans)

For crust: One flour, cocoa, sugar and salt in large mixer bowl. Add butter and blend until consistency of coarse meal. Gradually add coffee. Knead dough briefly. One form into log. Wrap in plastic wrap or foil and refrigerate one hour or overnight.
Lightly grease tiny muffin pans. Gently press top of each cup should be about 1/4 inches. Cut dough into four pieces, remaining refrigerated. Roll dough into circle 1/8 inch thick. Cut into circles using three-inch round cutter. Gently press into prepared cups. Repeat with remaining dough.
Combine chocolate, sugar, butter, milk and coffee liqueur to medium bowl and blend well. Add eggs and beat with mixer for two minutes. Spoon rounded teaspoon of filling into each muffin cup. Bake in oven at 350 degrees oven for about eight minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on rack. Store in airtight container.
To freeze, wrap dough tightly in foil. Approximately five dozen.

Treat every gun with respect

A part of the tragedy of a hunting accident is that, except in very rare cases, it should not have happened at all. There is almost no such thing as a truly unmanageable firearm or firearm accident. Practically every accident is the result of someone ignoring one or more of the basic rules of firearm safety.
Taking a few minutes to read and remember those instructions of gun safety might save a life this season.
(1) Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety — and the most important.
(2) Guns carried out range or home, or where otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have action open; guns always should be carried in case to the shooting area.
(3) Always be sure barrel and action while handling a gun.
(4) Unloaded guns should be stored in a secure container. Ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children.
(5) Never climb a tree or fence or other structure with a loaded gun, even if a gun happens to be in the trunk.
(6) Never shoot a bird or other animal over the shoulder of water, when it might be about to drink. Always back up when shooting.
(7) Avoid alcohol drinks before or during shooting.
