Full apples are becoming more plentiful each week, and with cooler days, warm desserts are a welcome change from light and icy ones. So for this week here are apple desserts.

APPLE CRUMBLE

- 2 quarts tart apples (about 15 medium apples) pared, cored and sliced
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 cup apple cider
- 2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup chopped, peeled apples
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup melted butter, oil and sugar. Add vanilla, pecans, raisins and apples. Stir together the flour, salt and soda, and add to mixture. Pour into greased 8 1/2 inch cake pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

APPLE DESSERT

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups white sugar
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 cup raisins
- 2 cups chopped, peeled apples
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup melted butter, oil and sugar. Add vanilla, pecans, raisins and apples. Stir together the flour, salt and soda, and add to mixture. Pour into greased 8 1/2 inch cake pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

A season opened Oct. 1 which all outdoormen should be particularly aware of this year. It's not a hunting season, but the fall forest fire hazard season, when special regulations governing burning of lots of fuel and when anyone who ventures into woodslands or brushlands should be especially careful about fire.

Woodslands in some counties still limits to all but firefighters and other authorized personnel.

FOREST FIRES are started by a variety of causes, including lightning, burning debris, careless smoking, campfires, the use of chain saws or other equipment, or vehicles. But the fact is that around 30 percent of Kentucky's forest fires are deliberate. Deliberate arson is the second most prevalent cause of forest fires in an average year. Fires caused by burning debris is the leading cause.

In 1982, the General Assembly substantially increased the penalties for deliberately setting woods or brush fires on the lands of another. This law is now a felony punishable by fines of from \$1,000 to \$5,000 and imprisonment of up to five years.

Other violations of the law can also include maintenance with minimum fines of \$100 and maximum of \$500. Special regulations are in effect during both the spring (March 15 to May 15) and fall (Oct. 15 to Nov. 30) fire hazard seasons.

During these periods it is illegal to set any fire within 100 feet of a woodlot or brushland except between 4:30 p.m. and midnight.
