Eye Openers

Glaucoma, the thief of sight

Glaucoma, a disease of the eye which can lead to blindness, is caused by an excess of fluid in the eyeball. This results in increased pressure in the eye which, in turn, damages part of the eye. Loss of vision follows.

Early detection and treatment of glaucoma can keep the pressure under control, reducing damage and the loss of sight.

Eye specialists can detect glaucoma by examining the optic nerve and by measuring the pressure of fluid in the eyeball with sophisticated instruments. Treatment of the disease includes special eyedrops and medication. There are some cases where surgery is indicated.

Persons with glaucoma experience periodic blurred vision, see colored rings around lights, and have difficulty focusing on objects close at hand. They may also feel pain. But sometimes these signs are not noticed until damage to the eye has already occurred.

Periodic eye examinations are important, especially for those who are over 35 years old.

Editor's note — This is the third and last in a series of three articles spotlighting candidates for the Nicholas County Board of Education. The same questionnaire was mailed to each candidate.

Profile: William E. (Billy) Hunter, age 36, is a resident of Liberty Road, Route 4, and seeks re-election in District 4. He is currently president of the local school board, has an 11th grade education from Winslow High School in Jessamine County and has no children presently in school here.

Why are you running for the board?
I feel that in this capacity, I can serve my community. I believe that the welfare of this community, state, and nation largely depends upon the quality of public education given to each student. I have strived that every student in this county regardless of income, race, or sex be given this opportunity.

I have been an active member of the Kentucky and National School Board Association serving two years (78-79) as vice chairman, two years (80-81) chairman of the Central Kentucky Region (27 school districts) two years (82-83) served as member Kentucky School Board Association Board. This has made me more aware of the problems facing education today and my personal, moral, and legal obligations to my community.

In the 18 years that I have served on the board, I have devoted time, thought, and study to my duties and responsibilities. I have tried to familiarize myself with legislation and issues facing education and taken to persons in the community in order to assure that the people that I represent have a voice at the local level.

What do you consider the most important issue facing educators and education today?
The changing technology in today's world makes it more important that education keep up with these changes. Small school systems on limited resources must continually seek ways to expand programs to provide the education for their students and expand drop out prevention programs.

If elected what changes, if any would you like to see made in the local school program?
To expand our existing programs to reach more low achievers and gifted talented students.

Profile: Marion Sims Jr., 36, lives at 112 Catherine Street in Carlisle and is a challenger in District 4. He is the owner of Sims Jewelry and also works at the post office. He is the parent of one child in the local school system.

Why are you running for the board?
It is time for a change. I feel need somebody on board that has children in school and that really cares what goes on in the local school system.

What do you consider the most important issue facing educators and education today?
Probably the hardest issue for teachers to overcome today is the problem of drugs. I realize there are drugs in this school but do we really want to keep them out? I know we cannot do a lot of things because of laws, state and federal, but we as parents and teachers have to do the best job possible to keep them out. We cannot stress everything to this problem but we have to keep it under consideration at all times. Drugs can cause a person's life very quickly.
