Child support owers put on notice to pay

The new federal child support enforcement law gives Kentucky additional means for collecting child support from delinquent parents and the Child Support Enforcement Agency will take advantage of the new provisions, according to the Director of Child Support Enforcement.

"Parents who owe child support to use every resource available to us to collect overdue payments," Williams said. "New actions include the ability to impose liens against real and personal property and have a lien on federal tax refund checks, as well as to withhold state and federal tax refunds, and to withhold wages after payments have been delinquent one month."

"Parents can no longer hide their assets to property and claim delinquency to pay child support," Williams said. "When they are delinquent in child support payments and have a lien on federal tax refund checks, we're going to tap that," Williams said.

Another new way the law allows parents to pay is to require state to give child support payment information to credit agencies.

"When the delinquent payments reach \$1,000, we must tell credit agencies if they ask," Williams said. "Parents of children whose payments have not been established by the time the child is five can no longer benefit from the child support statute until the child is 18 birthday."

Williams said that the law also allows parents to sue for child support enforcement.

Ag products average below July

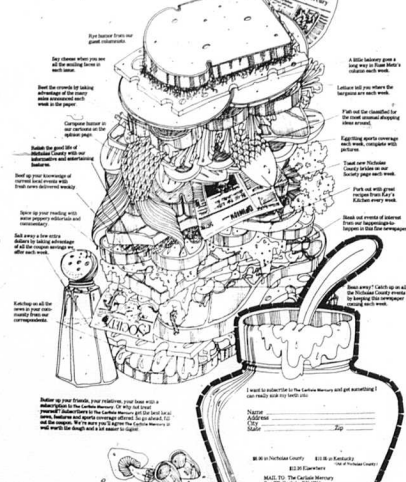
