**FOURTH DISTRICT FARM CREDIT BOARD APPROVES NEW ALIGNMENT**  
At their Sept. 23 meeting, the Fourth District Farm Credit board of directors approved a recommendation that calls for the district (Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio and Tennessee) to have 28 candidates for Federal Land Bank Association and Production Credit Associations by Jan. 1, 1967. This will replace the 25 Federal Land Bank Associations and 25 Production Credit Associations existing today. The approved timetable calls for three major consolidation-related activities to take place on or before the indicated target dates: "All four district FLBA and PCA's will be actively engaged in mergers and/or territorial transfers leading to common territories on or before April 1, 1965. "Final stockholder ratification agreements will be held and/or association based transfer agreements will be executed on or before July 1, 1965. "Implementation of consolidated association management and services will occur on or before Jan. 1, 1967. In Kentucky, the field pattern will result in the following changes: four FLBA mergers, two PCA mergers, eight FLBA territorial transfers and two PCA territorial transfers.

**Cong. Hopkins commended for fiscal responsibility**  
The National Taxpayers Union, founded in 1960, is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization representing over 100,000 members interested in reducing government spending and taxes. In its 11th annual Congressional Spending Study, the National Taxpayers Union (NTU) has recognized and praised Cong. Larry Hopkins (R-Ky., District 4) for his "outstanding voting record on behalf of the American taxpayer" during the first session of the 96th Congress. Jill Landwehr, NTU's congressional affairs director, said, "Where others say his service to fiscal responsibility, Congressman Hopkins' voting record is proof that his concern for the taxpayer genuine. According to NTU, Hopkins' score of 86 percent was the highest rating among the seven members of Congress in the Kentucky delegation. The score put Hopkins in the 90th percentile—meaning his score was higher than 90 percent of all other members of the House of Representatives. While the average House score fell three percentage points, Hopkins' score rose a dramatic 11 percentage points over his previous year's score. Hopkins' score compared extremely favorably both to the House Republican average of 79 percent and the House Southern average of 77 percent.
