## Overall soil moisture adequate for fieldwork

The first Weekly Crop-Weather Report of the season shows Kentucky farmers are starting their fieldwork earlier than last year. Better drained soils had dried sufficiently to support machinery. Worked areas will dry more rapidly, but the overall moisture situation is good for this spring period.

As of Friday, March 29, 1985 moisture was low percent short, 75 percent adequate and 23 percent surplus. Surplus moisture is still prevalent in many western and west central counties, while Central and Eastern Kentucky have mostly an adequate supply.

During the last week in March, three days out of six were favorable for fieldwork with fertilization of wheat, preparing and seeding tobacco, and plowing primary activities. Plowing was reported 68 percent complete, but many farmers have given a minimum or no plowing. There are a number of fields being plowed from harvesting equipment last fall, but farmers preserved and maintained most of their corn, soybeans, and wheat.

Preparation and seeding of tobacco beds has progressed rapidly and is now 75 percent complete in about of the five-

## Keeping deer off plant beds

WILDLIFE experts, especially biologists, are particularly concerned about the damage deer are doing to Kentucky counties.

It is an general agreement that the farmer's reputation of the wild deer is that it is a pest. In recent years as Kentucky's deer herd has expanded, reports of damage to tobacco beds have become more frequent. In a few areas where deer populations are abnormally high, there has been a dramatic rise in all kinds of crop damage by wildlife, although overall, these instances are isolated cases.

One method that has been proven effective in keeping deer from damaging tobacco beds is a stake-and-twice fence. Faced to be a controlled experiment on several central Kentucky lawns, the method has been highly recommended by Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' Deer Specialist John Phillips.

"There's no guarantee that the fence will work all of the time, but it certainly is better than leaving your tobacco bed unprotected," he said, adding that when property is constructed, the fence will be a major deterrent to deer. The single and separate methods have been found to be less effective than the stake-and-twice fence. Deer are attracted to the fence by the smell of the tobacco plants, and they are likely to be attracted to the fence by the smell of the tobacco plants.

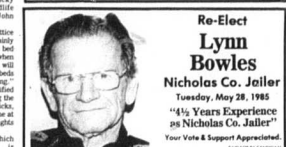

## Diaper rash first topic of new Mercury column

The Nicholas County Health Center would like to begin a column on health tips for children's column will be shared through children and health care services. Parents have many questions about proper care of their children. Especially the common problem of diaper rash for adults.

This column will begin with the topic of diaper rash, which can be a difficult but common problem for most parents.

The best treatment for diaper rash is prevention. Keep your baby clean, dry and free of urine and stool. Only the most careful parents will have a baby with diaper rash sometimes. When this happens do the following:

- 1) Change the diaper frequently, as soon as the baby is wet or soiled.
- 2) Wash the diaper with each diaper change. Do not use soap, or if you must, use a mild non-oxalated soap sparingly.
- 3) Put the diaper area dry with an towel, and if you have a hand held hair-dryer blow the area dry with the heat control on cool low. Do not put the diaper in the dryer.
- 4) Before putting on the next diaper, apply a bland ointment such as vaseline, A & D Ointment.

The secret to having a diaper rash is to keep the area dry. If you are using cloth diapers do not use the baby's diaper at a time. If several thicknesses of diaper are placed on the baby, the diaper will be changed less frequently and the skin will have longer contact with the wet or soiled diaper. It is also wise to discontinue plastic pants when the baby has a rash as the pants hold moisture in the area.

If your baby's diaper rash does not improve in one week after this treatment, see your doctor for help. Your baby may have bacteria, fungus or a virus on the rash and need medication for help.

## Chapter 1 program marks 20th birthday

April 11, 1985 marks the 20th anniversary of the passage of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. Originally called Title I, the program now called Chapter 1 has continued to provide assistance to disadvantaged students in Nicholas County by funding remedial programs and reading for students in grades 1-12 and in the 20th year period in which the program has operated.

During the 20th year period in which the program has operated in supplemental educational programs to aid Kentucky's educationally deprived children.

Statewide a total of 98,218 children were served by Chapter 1 funds in 1984, including about 22 in Nicholas County schools. The Department of Education estimates that two million children have program has been in effect for 20 years. The program was first authorized in 1965 by Chapter 1, Comprehensive Education Act of 1965, signed into law by Governor Letcher. The program was reauthorized by the program passed by the Kentucky State Board of Education on March 8, 1980. It was reauthorized by the late Congressman Carl D. Perkins in 1980. Perkins was the author of the program.

Throughout the 20 years in which this legislation has been law, certain aspects of the program have changed but the primary intent has remained the same — to expand and improve educational programs to meet the unique educational needs of economically and educationally disadvantaged children.

## Eye Openers

So Now You Need Reading Glasses

sooner or later, many people will need glasses for reading or doing close work. Regardless of how good your vision has been, the accommodative ability to focus on close objects may deteriorate after forty.

Once you have been examined by your optometrist and a corrective prescription has been written, there are three options for your new glasses:

1. You may wear lenses in a half-eye frame which you can look through for near visual tasks only.
2. You may order a full frame, which will have to be removed when you want to look at distant objects.
3. Some patients, who do not want to be bothered with taking off their reading glasses, or changing glasses when they want to see distant objects, opt for bifocal lens. In a bifocal, the bottom portion is used for near visual tasks, the upper portion may have no prescription or a distance correction with it.

If you have glasses already, bring them with you when you get a new examination. Guide the optometrist in making suggestions as to the type of eyeglasses which are best for coping with your new reading problem.
