Campgrounds available at Cave Run

The Zippo Recreation Area at Cave Run Lake in the Daniel Boone National Forest will open its vehicle access August 15 and remain open until Sept. 3, according to Merced District Ranger John Hattery. The area has been available for boat-only camping.

One hundred and forty-eight campsites in double camping units will be available. Each unit contains a table, fire grill and tent pegs. Four new comfort stations offer flush toilets, hot water and showers.

The area also contains a full swimming range and a swimming beach. The campground will be operated on a self-pay basis. Single camping units will be \$6 per night and double units \$8 per night. All money to the swimming beach only will be \$2 per car per day. Persons camping in the area will be admitted free to the beach. A campground host will be on duty to answer questions and assist campers.

The Zippo area is located on the south shore of Cave Run Lake.
