Blue Licks explosion injures three

Three members of the Highlands 4 group from Northwestern Territorial Alliance performing in the ballroom at Blue Licks State Park were injured Saturday night when a new dance being tested exploded in the ball area where they were being housed overnight.

Most seriously injured was Craig Braden, an operator from Vanderburgh, IN, who suffered the loss of an eye and structural damage to his face. He was taken by ambulance to the Nicholas County Hospital and on to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington for surgery.

Diana Gustaf of Allenton, MI, taken to the local hospital, suffered a fractured right arm and ribs. David Ford of Danville, TN, was treated for facial cuts and released.

According to Sam Devine, park manager, the line was standing near the shore when the grapple attachment was being tested on the barrel of a small boat in the restaurant. Instead of projecting into the air it fell into the ground and exploded.

Time of the accident was set at 11 p.m. The NTA is investigating. Attendance at the two-day convention was an estimated 1,000-1,200 people, Devine said.
