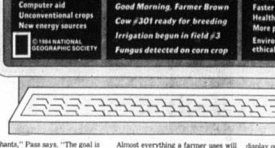

## Eye Openers

Tired Eyes

Q. After long periods of close work, eyes may become tired. What should one do for temporary relief?  
A. Take a break! Then, using small washcloths, apply hot and cold compresses to the eyes and to the entire face. The hot cloths should be used for 2 to 3 minutes. Alternate these with cold cloths. This helps to open the blood vessels in the face, relax the muscles and reduce the swelling from fatigue. Do this twice a day.

Q. Can tired eyes be prevented?  
A. It sometimes helps to look to distant objects now and then while doing close work. But the window, at a distance well back, or at a working position.

Q. First eyes are normal once in a while. If yours are tired most of the time, you may need to have your prescription changed, your pair of reading glasses or bifocals. You may be tired from lack of sleep, or you may not be getting enough rest. An optometrist will help determine WHY your eyes continue to be tired.

Advanced Genetic Science is well on its way to creating frost protection for plants. After determining that certain bacteria promote formation of ice crystals, scientists isolated the bacterial microorganism called *Arctic Bacteria*. When applied to crops, the new, stored bacteria crowd out the original bacteria, lowering the plants' freezing point. Used on a large scale, the new bacteria could lengthen growing seasons and push the nation's crop belt hundreds of miles north.

Other companies, such as Agriscience of Middletown, Wis., are designing disease and pest-resistant plants. "They definitely should reduce the use of herbicides, pesticides and fungicides," says Dr. W. Bruce Campbell, director of the World Bank of Agriculture. Some specialists predict, however, that the use of herbicides - weed killers - could go up as herbicide-resistant crops are developed.

**Adaptive fertilizers** are being developed by Dr. and other U.S. scientists also are being developed. They are designed to be responsive to soil conditions and to provide plants with the nutrients they need.
