Burley bill 'best possible under the circumstances'

After much months of negotiation between farm groups, manufacturers and the USDA, the Tobacco Reform Act of 1982 is in the hands of Congress. Introduced on July 10, the measure designed to save the tobacco program is already the subject of a program to amend the Senate Agriculture Committee on July 10.

A lengthy legislative process, it is expected it will bring about drastic revisions immediately in both basic and supplemental production and marketing, but its backers claim it would save the tobacco program. If further changes are needed, they argue, the act can be amended later.

ANSWERING questions that have been raised by some critics of some features of the bill, attorney Larry Perry points out that "though it is not a perfect program, it is simply

better than the alternative — the loss of the program with its resulting marketing chain that will crush small farmers."

Fergy who has represented the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association in the negotiations, along with chief counsel John M. Berry Sr. and Joe McLaughlin, said he is confident, in attending the Senate committee hearings in Washington.

LAST WEEK at the July meeting of the Burley Association board of directors, he warned that the tobacco program is in jeopardy, or of becoming no business to farmers that they will be forced to vote out in the statutory referendum scheduled for February 1985.

"It is neither a perfect plan nor a painless plan for tobacco producers," Fergy said. "It is,

however, in the opinion of those of us who have worked on it the best we could achieve under the circumstances."

This legislation does not work, the law can be amended later. But if the program dies, that is final. A vote cannot be held. If we use this program it is just for good. THE BILL calls for a sharp rollback of support prices to \$1.45 per pound, a 50-50 sharing of non-recurrent assessments by manufacturers and farmers, a buy-out of existing good stocks, and a special formula for future production levels.

Under the proposal the Burley Association would be taken over by the Kentucky Credit Corporation and disposed of. Any stocks issued within two years after the loan are called would be sold at steep discounts.

- * To accept 9:30 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. bid from General Tire Co. and 10:30 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. bid from (M) Shering.
- * To accept repair bid on central

office from J. & S Contractors at a cost of \$1,875.

* To issue elementary school to raise admission prices for basketball games to 75 cents for students and \$1 for adults for coming school year.

* To allow both schools to use pre-1979 paid for school pictures.

* To advertise for bids the following: Carpentry for board of buildings and repair of offices and maintenance supplies. Bids are to be opened at Aug. 12 board meeting.

* To hold a called board meeting on July 20 to discuss any and all legal business that might come before the board.

* To employ Willa Faye Mathes to drive bus No. 24 during 1983-84 school year.

* To allow East Union Alumni Association to use elementary school on Aug. 8 and Carlisle High School Alumni Association use of elementary school on Aug. 19.
