 "No person was too little for Charlie to have time for," Conry added.
 Attorney Roger Womack commented as follows: "Charles M. Cox, my friend Charlie, had all the attributes of a gentleman and a lawyer. He was knowledgeable of the law and with the availability and culture of a leading practitioner."
 "I KNEW HIM for over 40 years. I remember him as a lawyer who was truthful, dependable, fair, consistent and ethical. Many times we worked as associates in legal matters and also as opposing counsel in cases. He was a good county attorney. Eye Openers

ADULT AMBLYOPIA

At one time, it was believed that amblyopia—a "lazy eye" that sees poorly and cannot be fully corrected with lenses—remained a permanent condition unless this abnormality was detected and treated before a child reached the age of 6. This is no longer considered true. With patching, vision training and other forms of therapy, the vision in the adult amblyopic eye can be improved. It is, however, more difficult to treat the adult amblyopic eye and the degree of success may be more limited than when treatment is started in childhood.

The causes of amblyopia are many, but the condition is very often genetic and starts at a young age. Though both eyes may be healthy, the vision in each is so different that they cannot work as a team. The patient begins to use the weaker eye less and less until the images received from the weaker eye are totally shut off by the brain, which is the ultimate interpreter of what we see.

If the motivated patient cooperates fully with the ophthalmist over a period of time, vision can be improved.
