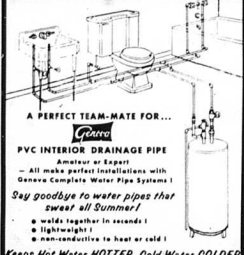

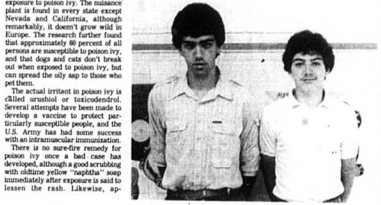

Kentucky Afield
Pets can spread poison ivy

Summertime is the season outdoor fun. But it is also the time when pets can spread poison ivy. One horse riding nature while hiking or horseback riding. But it's no secret that summer is also the time when ticks, mosquitoes and other insect pests are active. The subjects of this ivy, mosquitoes and other insect pests such as non-venomous ticks, biting flies, chiggers and bees that are not as likely to play havoc on an afternoon backyard barbecue or midweek frog-gather, as on an early morning fishing trip.

Campers, stream fishermen and backcountry hikers who routinely walk through high weeds, evergreen woods and creekbeds, probably come in contact with poison ivy more than any other group of nature outdoor enthusiasts. This plant has long been called the "itching agent" because of its powerful, itchy leaves. Poison ivy, Toxicodendron, has greenish flowers and small, white, five-petaled berries. It is a woody shrub or tree that grows in a wide range of conditions, and lives in most climates and latitudes, from alpine meadows and tundra to tall mountains and hardwood forests. They're found wherever there's standing water — irrigation ditches, ponds, lakes, swamps, and streams. It grows in automobile tires, trash heaps, and in the folds of water. It is not to be trampled in vegetation.

The most common symptoms of poisoning are drooping, dizziness, nausea, swelling, rashes, blisters, loss of appetite, and loss of energy.

Teacher evaluation on KEA agenda
"Teacher Evaluation: Practices and Potential" will be the topic of a Kentucky Education Association (KEA) conference June 14 and 15 at the Capital Plaza Hotel in Frankfort.

"This conference is an indication of KEA's strong commitment to full and effective evaluation of teachers," said KEA President Joe Herchenbach.

Herchenbach said teams of members and staff from each KEA district will hear presentations on career ladder proposals, interchanges for new teachers, evaluation and fair treatment of teachers, and training of evaluators. About 75 percent are expected to attend.

Special guests interested in educational reform have been invited to a June 14 luncheon speech by Dr. Arthur Wise, senior social scientist with the Rand Corporation, on "A Career Ladder at Carter Ladders and Other Places."

Vocational tuitions to increase
The Carlisle (Ky.) Mercury, Thursday, June 4, 1985 — 11

New look for Legend of Daniel Boone June 8
Tuition and registration fees will go up on August 1 for postsecondary students at the state-operated vocational schools, the Kentucky Department of Public Instruction announced.

John McDonald said the cost for full-time Kentucky students over 18 who are no longer attending high school will increase from \$10 a month to \$15. The one-time-only registration fee will go from \$10 to \$20.

The vocational programs offered throughout the state by the department's Office of Vocational Education remain "one of the biggest educational bargains anywhere," McDonald said.

The increase represents the accepted step of a phased adjustment in tuition and fees for postsecondary education that was adopted by the State Board of Education a year ago.

Wilbur Pratt, associate superintendent for vocational education, said the rate revision was "justified and badly needed." The increase barely keeps pace with inflation, he said.

For out-of-state students, full-time tuition will go from \$20 a month to \$25. The registration fee will go from \$10 to \$20.

Full-time Kentucky students will pay a tuition fee of \$5 a month, an increase of \$2. For full-time out-of-state students, tuition will be \$30 a month, an increase of \$5. Registration fees are the same as those for full-time students.

Short-term courses of 11 hours or less will cost 50 cents an hour for both Kentucky and out-of-state students. No charges are made for training in correctional facilities and for training of volunteers for unpaid occupations, such as volunteer firefighters.
