## High school experiments off in space

A series of six Kentucky high school student experiments will be conducted aboard a future NASA space shuttle flight as a part of "Project Challenge: The Kentucky Tomorrow Student Space Shuttle Program," according to Lt. Gov. Steven L. Beshear.

Beshear announced the statewide science education program designed to stress science education and to stimulate scientific experimentation among Kentucky's students during a recent press conference at the State Capitol.

The education project is sponsored by Kentucky Tomorrow, which Beshear created and chaired and will be conducted in cooperation with International Business Machines, The National Aeronautics and Space Administration will provide technical assistance during the project.

"Project Challenge" is open to students in grades four through 12 in each Kentucky school.

## Burley planting at record pace

The Kentucky countryside is generally beautiful as we enter the critical summer months of June, July and August. Soil moisture is reported six percent short. 85 percent adequate and 14 percent surplus. Overall, the Commonwealth is in good soil moisture situation for this time of year.

Approximately an inch of rain is needed weekly to maintain an adequate moisture supply. Since April 1 most of Central and Eastern Kentucky have had one to three inches less than normal rainfall.

Last week most areas received some rain, but farmers were still an average 43 days in the field. Tobacco setting, soybean planting and haying were primary activities.

Planting of the 1985 crop for grain crop is virtually complete. A few cover tobacco fields, corn for silage fields, and small acreages in Eastern

counties are left to be planted. Statewide, corn is 96 percent planted compared to 82 percent last year and the five-year average of 85 percent. Nearly 96 percent of the planted corn has emerged and most fields have a satisfactory stand. Most early corn looks great with advanced fields reaching waist to shoulder height. Conditions of corn is rated 13 percent fair, 47 percent good and 39 percent excellent.

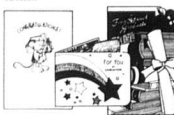
Planting was active last week, advancing to 6 percent complete compared to 24 percent a year ago and 12 percent for the average. Planting of double crop beans is beginning, but

some counties will not have many double crop beans because intended wheat acreage could not be worked because of the wet fall.

Burley setting progressed rapidly and is 28 percent complete compared with 21 percent last year and 36 percent for the average. Early reports indicate plants went into the ground in good condition and are getting off to a satisfactory start. Rain was beneficial, although some areas had a pounding rain which best plants. Damage was not believed to be extensive and very little replanting has been reported as of Monday.
