The annual budget for the Health Department for fiscal 1984-85 was amended to \$88,200 to show an increase in receipts due to unanticipated income from interest and carryover. The 1984-85 General Fund Budget was amended to read \$1,211,300 due to unanticipated revenue from the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

MEMBERS of fiscal year — Harold Mitchell, Orville Alkison, Melvin Fryman, Elmer Myers and Earl Plank — were named to the Solid Waste Plan Management Committee, in regard to the 30-year plan for solid waste in Nicholas County. The committee was formed at the request of Blue Grass Area Development District by Judge Stone.

Magistrates were told that the Division of Water, Flood Plain Management, is conducting workshops on National Flood Insurance program and that it will be necessary in the future to adopt an ordinance on flood damage prevention to comply with regulations. County attorney was asked to attend a workshop.

Mike Price of New York Life Insurance Company met with court to discuss the possibility of changing the county's group health insurance coverage to the firm. These plans were presented but no action taken. Shirley McCausland, a representative from Sun. Mitch McCrone's office also attended the meeting to ask about any problems which might arise during the transfer. It was the first of several periodic visits she will make here on other counties.
