Waterfowl stamp unveiled

The artwork for the state's first waterfowl stamp was recently unveiled in Frankfort. Representatives of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, Ducks Unlimited, and Frane House Gallery, Inc. were present during a brief ceremony in which an artist's proof of the stamp design was presented to Gov. Martin Letcher Collins.

Nationally known wildlife artist and conservationist Ray Harris was commissioned by Ducks Unlimited to produce the postage for Kentucky's "First of State" waterfowl stamp, which depicts a pair of mallard ducks flying through early morning haze.

Revenue from the sale of the stamp will go to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources to help finance waterfowl research, management programs and habitat acquisition. Sportsmen will be required to purchase a Kentucky waterfowl stamp, in addition to the federal waterfowl stamp, when hunting ducks and geese during the upcoming 1985-86 season, and each year thereafter.

WHEN THE Kentucky Waterfowl Stamp legislation becomes effective in July the stamp will go on sale at county court houses, and most all other places where fishing and hunting licenses can be purchased. The 10-cent stamp, which must be signed and affixed to hunting or combination hunting/fishing license, are priced at \$2.25 each.

An estimated 25,000 stamps are expected to be purchased by hunters, conservationists and stamp collectors (philatelists) with revenues totaling \$56,250. A large portion of the stamp will be sold as part of a 12 1/2-cent portfolio published by Frane House Gallery, Inc. in Lexington. The quantity of the signed and numbered edition prints will be determined by the "Gala market" and confirmed orders received on April 31, 1985.

The 6 1/2 x 9 1/2 stamp will be printed full color on acid-free paper, using high quality ink. The limited edition print, complete with one post stamp, will cost \$10.25. A large portion of the revenue from

the sale of the limited edition prints will go to Ducks Unlimited (D.U.), a private, non-profit organization has chapters in Canada, the U.S. and Mexico. Dedicated to preserving wetland habitat for waterfowl and other wildlife, D.U. was founded in 1981 by a group of conservationists and hunters alarmed by the drastic decline in waterfowl during the "Dust Bowl" years. Kentucky becomes the 34th state in the United States to issue a waterfowl stamp.
