KAHNS at Kennesa is second at \$2,430,000, third, Indiana, \$2,300,000; Cynthiana, \$1,700,000; and Millen at an unadvertised price.

Smallwood pointed out that Cynthiana will be undergoing two major water improvement projects within the next five years, and water rates will increase 24 percent.

ONE OF THE charts compared the maximum water usage rates for the Jersey locations. The figures are as follows: Carlisle with all amenities, over 50,000 gallons costing \$1.32; Cynthiana, over 1,000,000 gallons, 30 cents; Millen, over 997,000 gallons, 77 cents; Kennesa, over 25,000 gallons, 47 cents; Indiana, over 75,000, 40 cents; Millen, unlimited usage with no break in cost.

It seems that any city which has not undergone any major capital improvements can charge lower rates, but that there are many cities which due to antiquated systems and insufficient capacity levels, are finding themselves in the same shape as Carlisle.
