Kentucky farmers to be surveyed

The Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service has announced that Kentucky farmers will be asked to participate in a nationwide survey during late May and early June. Information obtained in the survey will be used to develop estimates of 1985 crop and livestock production. All individual information is confidential and used only in developing national and state estimates.

David Williamson, state statistician, said that concerns about cost of production and returns from farming are weighing heavily on farmers' minds this year.
 These uncertainties highlight the need for accurate and timely information. Producers can rely on farmer observations on the survey, in addition, to the key in developing accurate information.
 Representatives from Williamson's office will interview a cross section of farmers, and questionnaire will be mailed to others, to gather data for the estimates. National and state estimates will be published by USDA's Crop Reporting Board. A report on 1985 crop acreages will be available on July 15. Estimates of hay and pig numbers will be released on June 21, and cattle numbers on July 15.
