## outlook brightens for burley

The drought-damaged 1985 crop was 401.4 million, but the 1982 crop was a record 821 million pounds.

THE BURLEY Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association has 275 million pounds of pooled tobacco under lease from the 1982, '83 and '84 crops. Sales of this stored tobacco have been extremely slow. Alvin B. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer, reports that only 4.7 million pounds has been sold since Jan. 1, 1985, nearly four million of from the 1982 crop, and the remainder about equally from the '83 and '84 crops.

Lee McClain, president of the Burley Association, had predicted heavy pool receipts, possibly as much as 300 to 350 million pounds, from the 1985 crop unless legislative action was taken to lower the support.

"Such a tremendous added burden would load the cooperative with unbearable debt," he said. "But with this relief for the 1985 crop, we can begin to see daylight again, and some real progress if the Senate enacts the Tobacco Reform Act."

## Residents endorse seat belts

A majority of Nicholas County, along with other counties in the 8th Congressional District, favor enactment of a state seat belt law. Statewide, Kentuckians supported the concept by better than a two-to-one margin.

The findings are the result of a survey conducted by Marketing Research Group of Lansing, MI on behalf of Kentuckians for SAFETY (Keep-belts Are For Everyone, TRY Yours).

"We obviously are encouraged by these findings," said Jill McMillan, state coordinator of Kentuckians for SAFETY. Her organization is engaged in a two-fold effort to increase seat belt usage — one through seat belt legislation similar to that already adopted in 16 states, the other through public education campaigns.

As lawmakers start sifting through the multitude of bills they will address next year, it is sure the results of this survey will weigh heavily on assessing importance to this legislation.
