Future plans for school facilities reaffirmed

Future plans for facilities in the Nicholas County School District were reaffirmed Monday morning at a public hearing conducted by the State Department of Education. Those plans include the construction of new buildings and the addition of six more classrooms, as well as erecting a bus garage and engine repairs shop for roof maintenance.

Part of the money would come from state capital funds and leaves the local school board with the discretion to change priorities in the budget for major projects.
