4-H steers average \$1 a pound

Despite a very low cattle market, with support prices 80 cents and under, four Nicholas County boys received top prices for steers sold at last Thursday's 4-H and 4-H-A Bluegrass Steer Show in Lexington. Bill Dimesner, representing the First National Bank, bid \$11 per pound (\$1,141.20) for a 1,130 pound Limousin Hereford raised by Jonathan Moore, and \$1 per pound (\$1,215) for a 1,215 pound Limousin Cross cow raised by J.F. Juday. Marvin Caswell, of Nicholas County Feeders, also bid \$1 per pound (\$1,260) for a 1,260 pound Cho-Ange sold by Todd Day. Jamie Simons' 1,135 pound Cho-Ange also sold for \$1 a pound and was purchased by Gayle Kelley of Carlisle 4-H and Doug Garrett of Garrett's Furniture, who split the \$1,135.50.

This year's annual show and sales were held at Bluegrass Show grounds No. 2. A number of Nicholas County boys were on hand to support the 4-H event.

Firemen fight three fires in three days

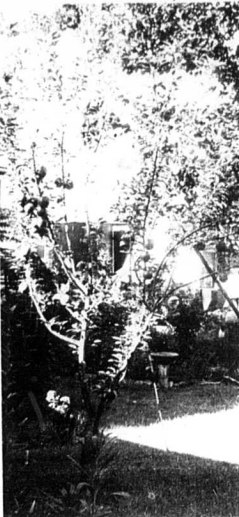
Car fire blows, causing wreck

A one-vehicle accident September 18 on the Lower Jackson Road west of Nicholas County man to the local hospital for treatment.

David Morris, 288 Graves Road, suffered multiple head and body injuries when a fire reportedly blew out on his 1979 Chevrolet, causing him to lose control of the car which went over an embankment and struck two trees.

Members have been received, however the Rotary Club is making an additional plea to all who know Cox to please join in this effort to create a lasting tribute to this man.

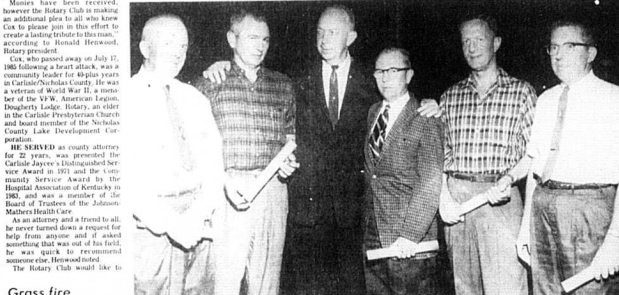

American Legion, Dougherty Lodge, Rotary, an elder in the Carlisle Presbyterian Church and board member of the Nicholas County Lake Development Corporation.

HE SERVED as county attorney for 22 years, was presented the Carlisle Mayor's Distinguished Service Award in 1971 and the Community Service Award to the Hospital Association of Kentucky in 1981 and was a member of the Board of Trustees of the Johnson-Mathers Health Care.

An attorney and a friend to all, he was a man who was willing to help from anyone and if asked something that was out of his field he was quick to recommend someone to handle it.
