A beautiful Easter weekend closed out the last week of March on a warm and sunny note. Fieldwork was active last week as 23 days out of six were suitable for field activities. Tobacco, plant, bed preparation and seeding, fertilization of wheat, pasture and corn ground, plowing and pasture seeding were common activities.

A few corn fields were reported planted in Callaway and Simpson counties with a number of other reports indicating that corn planting would begin this week. As of Friday, March 28, soil moisture was rated 14, and five percent adequate for corn. Most of the wheat in the western third of the state has been fertilized.

Water damage to lucerne acreage was generally not as severe as small grains. Reports indicate about a nine percent loss in alfalfa stand and 19 percent in red clover.

PASTURE GROWTH is generally behind a year ago. Approximately one-fourth of current roughage

instead of conventional plowing. Last fall, harvesting from mid-November on was accomplished under wet conditions leaving a number of fields rotted.

TURKOCK PLANT BED seeding was 36 percent complete by Sunday, March 24. This compares with 89 percent last year and 60 percent for the five-year average. A few of the earliest seeded beds had plants up.

Condition of fall seeded grass is extremely variable across the state. Average loss due to winter kill has been considerable in the Bluegrass portion of Kentucky. Reports of winter kill in Central and Northern Kentucky range from none to heavy loss.

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requirements for cattle are being supplied by pasture feed. Slightly over 80 percent of our livestock farms still have herds on some winter feed. Hay supplies are ample in all areas of the state. Most livestock came through the relatively mild winter in good condition.

Warm, dry week was experienced across Kentucky. A cold front bringing scattered showers and a mid-week return to normal temperatures.

Rapid warming occurred again on March 27 through the weekend. Temperatures averaged 8.1 degrees above normal with most areas reaching the lower 80s the second half of the week. Coldcutting occurred mid-week in the mid to mid 20s. Rainfall was 0.25 inch or less for the week. These amounts were about 0.75 inch below normal for the week.
