Crafts, art and entertainment will highlight the 1986 Kentucky Craft Market and Art Exhibition scheduled April 5 and 6 at 2 p.m. at the state's top craft producers, and for the second year, the popular market has been expanded to include a juried exhibition and sale of contemporary work by Kentucky artists.

The market and art exhibition will be held in Heritage Hall East at the Lexington Center, and will open at 10 a.m. on Saturday and at 1 p.m. on Sunday. It will close each day at 4 p.m.

Entertainment will include fashion shows at 1 p.m. Saturday and 1 p.m. Sunday, and there will be musical entertainment all during the day both days.

On Saturday, Kentucky Country band will be featured. The group is made up of a host of Hatfield family members, including talented 8-year-old Nathan, his four-year-old daughter Elizabeth and their one-year-old cousin, Sarah Horton. All the youngsters were lively music from small fiddle handmade by their father, Kenny Hatfield. They also do bluegrass guitar, banjo, mandolin, and drums. Kentucky Country has been featured on Ralph Kinney's "Nashville Now" show as well as appearing on "Hee Haw" this summer.

The Castlewood Morris Dancers, who will appear at 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Saturday, have been performing together for five years. 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Graham rules in power case

Franklin Circuit Judge William L. Graham Tuesday upheld a Public Service Commission's refusal to allow Kentucky Power to pass along to its customers the cost of expensive unit power purchased from the American Electric Power System's Rockport, Indiana, nuclear plant.

According to allegations made by Attorney General David L. Armstrong and other intervenors in the case, the unit power agreement was entered into between Kentucky Power and its affiliated company, even though cheaper alternative power supplies were available at the time.

The Public Service Commission, the state's rate-making body, could deny recovery of those excessive costs when immediately incurred.

The court also upheld the PSC decision to include in Kentucky Power's rate base only 41 percent of the company's investment in the Hanging Rock deferral extra high voltage transmission line which the company had maintained to serve to Kentucky Power's Kentucky customers. In refusing to allow the remaining 59 percent of the company's investment, the court indicated that the PSC correctly determined that the entire investment of approximately \$123 million greatly exceeded "Kentucky Power's immediate needs."

"We are certainly pleased with the court decision," Armstrong said. "We had consistently argued that Kentucky ratepayers should not be required to pay for a mistake by the PSC. Now we are making an unnecessary and exceedingly expensive investment not to pay for expensive unit power when cheaper supplies are readily available."

FmHA announces Homesteaded program
Farmers Home Administration borrowers who have to leave their farms for financial reasons may be able to retain their homes, according to Kendall L. Seaton, Kentucky State Director.

Under the dwelling retention (homesteaded) program, a farm home acquired by FmHA through voluntary conveyance, foreclosure or bankruptcy proceedings can be passed back, under certain conditions, to the former owner with an option to purchase.

"A former FmHA borrower can apply to FmHA to lease the farm home and a reasonable amount of land," usually about five acres, for up to five years with an option to purchase when he or she is financially able. The former owner must have sufficient income to make rental payments and to maintain the property in good condition.

To be eligible for the program, a farmer also must show that in at least two out of the last five years, gross farm income amounted to \$4000 or more and that 60 percent of family income came from the farm operation, Mr. Seaton said.
